

PUBLIC POLICY AAUW of OR has come together and scored great success recently according to Pat Garner, our State Public Policy representative. On February 22nd, the House Committee on Business and Labor and the Senate Workforce Committee held hearings on Fair Pay (HB 2005; SB 752). In response to a 2-Minute Activist Action Alert about supporting the Fair Pay bills, over 200 AAUW of OR members hit the "submit" button. Many added their own personal stories and comments to the emails, which made them even more special.

In order to get an idea of our national focus toward the political road ahead, refer to the national AAUW website and click on "Advocacy" on the left side. There is a 12 step program for how AAUW will continue its nonpartisan work under the current administration. By the way, Equal Pay Day is April 4.

FEBRUARY 2017 FINANCE VP'S REPORT

Income during the month was \$505, of which \$500 was from the Storytelling Guild for our Children's Festival food booth inventory. This fundraiser has ben discontinued. The amount will be posted to general income for the 2017/18 fiscal year. Expenses were\$34.67 for a gift for a speaker and the newsletter. The checking account balance was \$3,666.37 and the savings account was \$9,095.03 with the CD balance unchanged. Please be aware that we are starting to collect the 2017/18 dues right now.

MUWCF Medford University Women Charitable Fund Marlene Olson, MUWCF Liaison

Due to the generosity and hard work of our branch we are awarding \$12,220 in scholarships this year. We are giving five \$1500 scholarships (4 Traditional and 1 Technical) to Rogue Community College and two \$1500 scholarships to Southern Oregon University. For middle-school age girls we are contributing two \$800 scholarships to ACADEMY (a week-long residence program for gifted and talented girls) and three \$40 scholarships to AWSEM (the Advocates for Women in Science, Engineering & Math symposium). Thank you for your support of these young girls and women.
