RIGHT HERE IN OUR STATE

Remember the line in *The Music Man*, "right here in River City"? Well, right here in Oregon we have a huge issue that often flies under the radar: human trafficking. Many of us were shocked that it's a problem throughout the I5 corridor and it seems that information was the tip of the iceberg. Data shows that at the state level, Oregon falls woefully short when it comes to complying with reporting sexual offenders.

Oregon is statistically not complying with laws on the books. Level 1 and Level 2 sex offenders don't even show up on the public data system in Oregon. Only Level 3 sex offenders can be located there. There are 28,500 sexual offenders in our state, leading the nation. A recent report by KATU's Joe Douglass noted, "Oregon now has the most sex offenders per capita in the U.S. according to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, which in June released a map showing the state had 713 sex offenders per 100,000 residents. Nationwide it showed there were 262 offenders per 100,000." Oregon came in *three times* the national average. More than 98% of Oregon's sex offenders are not listed publicly and thousands are not complying with the law. Per an investigation report, Oregon State Police stated in July that Oregon is not following several federal requirements.

In Oregon, we do have a version of Jessica's Law (mandatory minimum sentences for sex offenders) and a version of Megan's Law (registration by sex offenders). The problem is that, according to the KATU investigative report, that registration is kept from the public for whom it was designed to protect. The average citizen cannot access a large part of the information on sex offenders. So, when you go online and find a sex offender listed in your neighborhood, realize they are a Level 3 offender and many more most likely live in your area completely unknown.
