Ever wanted to speak face to face with your state senators or representatives? Lobby Day gives you that chance with help on how to be effective. Thursday, April 11, from 12:30-5:30, in Salem (the day before the state convention) is AAUW of Oregon Lobby Day. You may attend only Lobby day, Registration is due April 1, fee is \$23, or both for a chance to network with members from Oregon. Coordinate with Gayle Clason for travel arrangements. Details are in the current Oregon News.

AAUW's Two-Minute Activist is a way to communicate with U.S. Congress, use e-mail or phone alerts for action. Input from constituents counts; they need to step up to accomplish the job they were elected to do. Current concerns are Family Act (paid leave), paycheck fairness and raising the federal minimum wage to \$15. These priorities are determined by members' votes on public policy.

If you are NOT a member, you might want to consider it. Mercy Flights is our local ground and air ambulance service. If you are a member and need transport, Mercy Flights will bill your insurance and will accept what your insurance pays as "payment in full". If insurance doesn't cover the transport, you will be responsible for 50% of the bill.

Mercy Flights is a 501(c)3, and if you do not receive services for any year, the cost of your membership is a tax deductible donation. Your membership covers you and your spouse/significant other/life partner, including those in a care facility. New members, please see Diane Reiling for the necessary enrollment form. Most of the Retirement Communities have their own (larger) group, so do check that first! Our renewal deadline is March 31st, so please have checks to me by March 25th.
