PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

BREAKING NEWS FROM SALEM... Gayle Clason, Joan Rycraft and I joined about 75 other AAUW leaders from around the state April 11-14 for what will be the last State AAUW Convention. (Not to worry... There will still be these gatherings, but the assembled group voted to change the name from "Convention" to "Annual Meeting.") The weekend at the Salem Convention Center & adjacent Grand Hotel was jam-packed with Lobby Day activities, Enrichment Tours, banquets, inspiring speakers, fund-raising opportunities, workshops, business sessions and district/board meetings... so we were kept hopping from Thursday through Sunday. Through it all, we had lots of opportunities to hob-nob with old and new AAUW friends, too.

Here are some of the weekend's highlights:

• Lobby Day – Gayle and I met with Senator Jeff Golden to urge his support for HB 2562, which would raise the current .25 FTE for the State Title IX Coordinator position to 2 FTE and to make other improvements to the State's handling of the whole Title IX issue, as many Title IX mandates have been unaddressed in our state for a long time. We are hopeful that Senator Golden heard us and will support the passage of this bill.

• Elections – All Recommended Candidates for 2019-2020 State positions were elected unanimously. They are: Co-Presidents-Elect Pat Lehman (Wallowa County/ Salem) & Sue Klumph (Grants Pass); Program VP Pat Squire (Lake Oswego); Membership VP Gini Dideum (Seaside); Finance VP Sarah Elmer (Bend); Secretary Kristin Mauro (Salem). Newly elected District Directors are: North Central -- Nancy Dunis (Lake Oswego) and our own Joan Rycraft for the South District.

KIM CHURCHES

We in Oregon were very lucky to have Kim Churches join us for the Convention weekend. In two mostly-extemporaneous talks, our National leader informed, challenged and inspired every person in the room. Taking the reins of National only recently, Kim brings a wealth of experience and – more important – a true passion for everything that AAUW stands for and accomplishes for women and girls. She is also a talented money-manager, it seems, so we can be more confident than ever that the dollars we send off to Washington, D.C. will be put to the very best use.

Kim's theme for us is "This is Your Moment to Take Action." The actions she promotes are:

- 1. Take the training and promote Work Smart Online.
- 2. Get involved with Policy initiatives
- 3. Contribute to the AAUW Greatest Needs Fund.

Work Smart Online – If you are thinking that this training – generally called "Salary Negotiations Training" – is not for you ("I'm no longer working," you say), Kim points out that each of us needs to negotiate something all the time. The FREE Work Smart Online course teaches skills that come in handy when you're at the car dealership or any vendor location, when family tasks arouse "discussion" or just about any time there are two or more sides of an issue (and you want to know how to prevail).

Coca-Cola has awarded AAUW National a huge grant based on National's commitment to register 100,000 people to take Work Smart Online training by August, 2019. As Kim said, "Failure is not an option," as National simply cannot refund the money grant!

What should YOU do? Go to your computer or smart-phone and type in salary. AAUW.org to register for Work Smart training. You can go through the course at your own pace, always keeping in mind that as you are helping your own negotiations skills to grow, you are ensuring that AAUW National will maintain Coca-Cola's big grant (and maybe get other ones).

Public Policy initiatives – Pretty much self-explanatory... We in AAUW are a powerful force behind so many of today's necessary programs. We just need to be involved!

Contribute to AAUW's Greatest Needs Fund – Kim shared her sincere gratitude for every donation to every one of AAUW's Funds, also pointing out that there are many huge "unfunded areas" that cannot receive money from donations to designated funds. To pay for the millions of dollars budgeted for things like Public Policy & Research, office rent & staffing, Conventions support and so many other necessities, donations to AAUW Greatest Needs Fund are essential. While she is best known for her career as an astronaut, her most impressive achievement might have been maintaining her composure while dealing with reporters' absurd and often offensive questions. People Magazine's Michael Ryan once wrote about some of the worst offenders, including "Do you weep when things go wrong on the job?" To this Ride replied, "How come nobody ever asks [a male fellow astronaut] those questions?"

PUBLIC POLICY UPDATE Gayle Clason

At the AAUW of Oregon Convention in Salem, members were able to hear and interact with Kim Churches, new CEO of AAUW. She is vivacious, intelligent and well spoken, just the leader that this organization needs. Hearing the financial difficulties of our organization (with dues covering only 15% of an already lean budget) was eye opening!

On April 1st, you received an e-mail from Kim Churches urging you to VOTE to select the Board of Directors and vote on amendments to our 2019–21 Public Policy Priorities, providing the framework for the advocacy work we do at the local, state and national levels. Look for this (It will probably be sent again).

Your voice and your vote are vital to AAUW's future. That's why it is so important for you to participate in the 2019 AAUW National Election to elect members to our board of directors and set AAUW's Public Policy Priorities. AAUW is a "grassroots" organization, so take the time to examine the candidates' statements and give direction to lobbying efforts at State and National levels. Online voting is now open and will close on May 14 at 6:00 p.m. ET. You may interrupt this voting and complete it later. By the way, Mardy Stevens, our dual Medford member from Gresham, is on the ballot.

Bonnie and I attended AAUW Lobby Day in Salem with briefings and a visit to Jeff Golden, Senator from Southern Oregon. As Bonnie mentioned in her Message, we urged him to support HB 2562, increasing personnel handling Title IX in the Department of Education from .25 FTE to 2 FTE. Optimism is high that K-12 funding for Education has become a priority during this session after 30 years of underfunding, resulting in Oregon racing to the bottom.

We are now nationally ranking 6th largest in class size, 3rd in shortest school year and 3rd lowest in graduation rate. Oregon spends \$10,842/ student, while the national average is \$12,910/student, with the highest per student rate (Vermont) at double Oregon's rate! At a time of economic security in Oregon, corporate taxes are 50th, lowest in the nation. Keep in mind: Schools provide future workers for businesses that are currently recording record profits!

Washington State pays their teachers 20-25% more than Oregon teachers, which causes over-stressed teachers to migrate north. There is no doubt: the future of Oregon depends on adequate funding of schools.

The Theme of Lobby Day this year was Student Success, giving us hope that finally this appears to be a priority with this legislature, but results will depend on the entire Oregon budget. As Senator Golden told us, there are many needs in the state that are competing for revenue dollars.

A request for support of Senate Bill 794 was also presented to Senator Golden during our brief meeting. This bill concerns tracking married students and students with children on their college success. Unfortunately, Oregon doesn't track how many of our students find themselves in this situation. We can't determine whether student parents graduate at the same or different rates as others. We don't know whether student parents drop out at the same or different rates as students without children, or if they take longer to obtain a degree or feel they must limit their career aspirations.

And Kudos to the large group of elementary students with teachers crowded into Senator Golden's office for the appointment after the Medford AAUW team. This group is having an introduction to influencing policy at an early age.
