PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

REFLECTIONS ON A YEAR WITH MEDFORD AAUW

A year ago I took on the two-year post as your president, after attending only one General Meeting and one board meeting as a branch member. My aim at the time was to save the branch from closing down - or from being absorbed into another local branch -- because no one had stepped up to fill the required administrative leader position and time was running out...

It has been a challenging year, to say the least, but I believe true progress has been made. With the support of dedicated members of the board and branch members, we have implemented changes that are revitalizing the branch. Here are some of them:

- General Meetings are now program-based: By moving most business matters to the monthly board meetings, our General Meetings are now both educational and entertaining, offering Short and Featured Programs on a variety of topics, both Mission-based and wide-ranging. Branch members are kept informed of board business matters via email; and matters requiring member votes continue to be part of the agenda for General Meetings.
- Thursday evening meetings are offered: To accommodate our members for whom Saturday morning meetings are inconvenient, our General Meetings in October and April are held on Thursday evenings at Sun Oaks Clubhouse. Attendance at our evening meetings this season has been consistent (number-wise) with Saturday attendance, with a number of people not seen at Saturday meetings joining us on Thursday.
- The Joint Board Meeting now includes MUWCF: Beginning last June, I invited members of the MUWCF board to be part of the annual Joint Board planning session, acknowledging the important role that our branch's charitable arm plays in the philanthropic work of Medford AAUW. The MUWCF Board has been invited to join the outgoing and incoming AAUW Board members again this June 29th for planning the 2019-2020 season. All branch members are invited to join us.
- Additions and Subtractions at meetings: Member sign-ins and monthly prize raffles have been added. The sign-ins will reap their reward at our June meeting, as we will thank members who have attended five or more General Meetings by including their names in a special drawing. The prize? PAID National membership for 2019-2020!

In March, I spent the day at GIRLS ROCK! in Grants Pass to learn about the S.T.E.M. program the local AAUW, Soroptimist and Zonta organizations provide for girls each year. A program that began small twelve years ago now welcomes nearly 200 girls ages 9-13, each with an accompanying adult, for an array of hands-on workshops offering activities in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. The three service organizations share responsibility for putting on the event, with each group taking the lead every third year. As materials and lunches are donated and workshop leaders are volunteers, the cost for the all-day event is relatively small. I came away from GIRLS ROCK! eager to expand the S.T.E.M. opportunities for young girls here in Medford.

For years, our branch's MUWCF charity has funded the attendance in Ashland of up to ten girls at AWESUM every spring (a one-day event @ \$40-45) and two girls at the weeklong SOU Academy every summer (@ \$800). We definitely want to continue sponsorship of these outstanding programs.

Recently, the regional council of the Girl Scouts held a one-day S.T.E.M. event, the first large-scale one for them, providing activities for more than 175 "girls, parents and siblings" to raise awareness of the promise science-focused careers hold for girls. (See "Getting a Good Feel for Science and Technology," The *Medford Tribune*, May 3, 2019, page B3.) This event and GIRLS ROCK! have a lot in common; and both are in sync with ideas our branch's S.T.E.M. committee have been tossing around.

Perhaps our AAUW branch can consider working with a group like the Girl Scouts and/or other service organizations to make a Medford S.T.E.M. Day an annual event for the young girls of our community. Would you like to discuss this possibility for 2020? I invite you to join Janet Brougher, Elizabeth Harris, Dawn Stewart. Glenda Sims. Shiena Polehn, Bonnie Goldfein and me (our S.T.E.M. committee) to share ideas for our branch's opportunities to expand the S.T.E.M. programs for young girls in Medford.

The Medford branch awarded six \$2100 scholarships this year. The recipients are Celeste Moreno and Melinda Terilli for Southern Oregon University. For Rogue Community College, recipients are: Stormi Bachus (a technical scholarship), Valerie Miller, Darrin Plantega and Kylee Smith.

At the Scholarship Luncheon on May 18th the recipients spoke of their dreams and aspirations and were given student memberships in AAUW for the coming year.

Celeste noted that she is a second-generation Mexican-American and the first in her family to attend college. Currently working at Harry & David in graphic design, she looks toward achieving a Masters degree in business administration and marketing.

Mindy is also her family's first generation college student, with a goal to earn a Master of Arts & Teaching, where she can continue to apply her Bachelors degree in Literary Theory to the teaching of history.

Darrin Plantenga is in her first year at RCC, returning to college at age 53 to pursue a degree in Human Services. She will transfer to SOU to complete her four-year degree in Human Services & Business, after which she plans to open a recovery center for women in the Rogue Valley.

Kylee Smith's college career at RCC will lead her to an Associates degree in Biology, followed by a Bachelors degree in Psychology then medical school, where she plans to specialize in dermatology.

AAUW Scholarship Liaison Gail Etchie advised all the recipients planning advanced degrees to be aware of the AAUW endowments that might assist them in funding their post-graduate studies.

Recipients unable to attend the luncheon were Valerie, who had to work, and Stormi, who was in Portland competing in the contest for TALENT OREGON, where she and her team were presenting their invention – a prosthesis for canine amputees. (Stormi will present a program about their invention in the 2019-2020 season.)



ROGUE RETREAT BASKETS

More cleaning supplies are needed. This past year our ACT project has been handing out cleaning supply baskets to women in the Rogue Retreat program. Rogue Retreat is a community program to help homeless people regain their dignity and take the steps to reenter productive society. These baskets go to women who have earned the privilege of having their own apartments and it is a way of encouraging them in this next step.

Since Chad McComas and Jennifer Covarrubias came to our April branch meeting, they have become even more appreciative of our efforts and the request for baskets has increased. We are out of supplies now and hope to replenish our stock for the summer.

We chose cleaning supplies because non-food items are not available at food banks or on Snap cards. The Dollar Store is a great resource, especially for the small laundry baskets to fill. You can make a whole basket or simply donate some items. Ideas include Windex, Comet, multipurpose cleaners, Soap, detergent, paper towels, wipes. Some other items include pot holders, spatulas, measuring cups, sponges, can openers.

Please bring items to the June 1st meeting. Thanks so much for making this a successful project.



Paying attention to politics on three levels – local, state and national – can be compared to riding a rollercoaster: There are moments of highs followed by lows.

STATE

A high point lately would be the passage on May 13th of the Student Success Bill #3427 though the Oregon Senate. AAUW lobbied for this bill, which directs funds to classrooms from a .05 percent tax on Oregon corporations with gross receipts exceeding \$1 million. This tax is expected to raise \$2 billion dollars for our state's classrooms.

Until now, many of these large corporations have been given tax breaks for locating here or they have paid zero dollars in state taxes. Governor Brown signed the Bill into law.

We have had 30 years of school funds paying the PERS debt owed to public retirees (due to an over-optimistic contract, which was not covered by adequate reserves). This money had to come from the state's funding of schools, leading to fewer school days, overcrowded classrooms, the loss of many valuable programs, school nurses covering many schools, textbooks not being updated and many more detrimental situations.

The low point preceding the passage of #3427 was the departure of the Senate Republicans to delay voting until some bartering on other legislation was possible,

leading to those members interested in mandatory vaccination of school children and tightening gun laws being disappointed.

NATIONAL

Public policy change is slow to come, as we all know. The Equal Rights Amendment proposed by Alice Paul in 1923 was not approved by Congress until 1972, and it needs three-fourths of the states (38) to ratify it to make it part of the Constitution. The original ratification deadline of 1982 has long passed. Oregon ratified it in 2014.

Today only one more state is needed to make this part of the Constitution! Still to ratify: Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Nevada, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Utah, and Virginia. So here's hoping the legislative bodies in these remaining states sit up and listen, because although ratifying the amendment today is 37 years late, it's better now than never.

STATE & NATIONAL

BTW, politics in other states also affect Oregonians. On May 15th, the Alabama Governor signed the most restrictive abortion bill in the nation, which does not even allow abortions in cases of rape or incest. Ultimately, this issue may end up in the Supreme Court as a way to overturn Roe v Wade.

Buckle up, America, it may be a bumpy ride!


Thank you to members who have volunteered to bake/bring 3 dozen cookies for our upcoming Garden Tour. They will be a friendly addition for our guests at the tour!

SPOTLIGHT: RONNIE BUDGE

Born and raised in New York City, I attended Barnard College (Columbia University) and then received a degree in library science from the University of Michigan. I met my husband Ed at the Library of Congress, where we each were management interns. It didn't take much for him to talk me into moving to the West Coast where he grew up. We spent three years in Berkeley before heading to the Rogue Valley with our then-one-year-old son.

In 1974 I became head of the reference department of the Jackson County Library System. More than thirty years later I retired, after 20 years as its Director. Among many changes during those years, we remodeled, expanded, or replaced each of the 15 branches. This was thanks to a bond measure in 2000 that had the support of AAUW and the broader community. More recently, Jackson County voted for a self-governing library district with its own dedicated tax base. I'm thrilled to see the many new programs that bring people of all ages and backgrounds through the library doors.

After retirement and feeling out of touch, I joined Medford AAUW. That got me back into the swing of things. At my first branch meeting, Barbara Basden asked me to help with the then-new Fall Garden Tour. Subsequently, I chaired this major fund-raiser, now a spring tour coordinated by a great committee. Later I helped organize the "Out and About" interest group, and I always enjoy the monthly discussions about mystery novels and DINEing out with my AAUW friends.

I credit my father, who took me for long walks in the Connecticut countryside during summer vacations, for instilling a love of Nature, the outdoors, and gardening. My first garden was a window box over our fire escape. Now as a Master Gardener with the OSU Extension Service, I mentor students who propagate plants to sell at the Spring Garden Fair, do public speaking, and am vice-president/president-elect of the Jackson County Master Gardener Association. It's yet another way to help sustain the quality of life in our beautiful Rogue Valley.



THE EIGHTH REASON

NEGOTIATION

- 6. Help AAUW reach its goal to train 100,000 women by August 2019, and ten million women by 2022.
- 7. Tell your family and friends about Work Smart Online!

THE EIGHTH REASON

While the training seems to target women currently pursuing careers (and many of us in the Medford AAUW see our careers in the rear-view mirror), the training includes valuable tips about effective negotiation in any situation. PEARL S. BUCK

June 26, 1892
Pearl Buck spent most of her first forty years with her missionary parents in Zhenjiang, China, the site of her best-selling novel, The Good Earth, which earned her a Pulitzer Prize in 1932. Returning to the United States in 1935, she became a powerful advocate for the rights of women and minority groups, writing powerful political treatises, as she also continued writing best-sellers. In 1938, she was the first woman to receive the Nobel Prize for Literature.



BELLA ABZUG July 24, 1920 Noted for her flamboyant hats, "Battling Bella" was an American lawyer, U.S. Representative, social activist and a leader of the Women's Movement. In 1971, she joined Gloria Steinem, Shirley Chisholm, Betty Friedan and other feminists to found the National Women's Political Caucus. In later years, she co-founded the Women's Environment and Development Organization (WEDO), "a global women's advocacy organization working towards a just world that promotes and protects human rights, gender equality, and the integrity of the environment."



GERALDINE FERRARO August 26, 1935 An attorney from New York who served three terms in the U.S. House of Representatives, Geraldine rose rapidly in the Democratic Party, sponsoring legislation to bring financial equity for women. In 1984, she became the first female vice presidential candidate for a major party, when Senator Walter Mondale selected her as his running mate. A vocal advocate for human rights, she held a number of prestigious government positions in the 1980's and 1990's and served on Hillary Clinton's 2008 presidential campaign committee.
