Grefe, who was inducted into lowa's Hall of Fame in 1980, is a specialist in adult education, and founder and president of LEAD Associates, Ltd. She is a feminist and activist on behalf of equity for women, and has discovered how to develop leadership skills, how to motivate people, and how to bring about change through action. She is a very warm and moving speaker, and members will have many opportunities during the convention to meet and talk with her.



A recent obituary revealed that the deceased had been a member of AAUW. Although I had not known this elderly lady, my curiosity was aroused, wondering what her participation in AAUW had been in another time, how she had contributed to AAUW history and in turn, to "Women in History." The decision of this woman to join AAUW, an organization of persevering women holding degrees, had contributed toward education opportunities, and legal, social and economic equity for women: her dues have helped train

women, moving them into policy-making positions where they have influenced an increasing number of public issues.

"AAUW Women in History" have continually reinterpreted the history of the organization in order to meet contemporary needs. At the same time, contradictions between lip service and a commitment of members to the goals of AAUW are tested. Emotionalism sometimes obscures reality and consequences in decision making. Change, therefore, does not come about easily in society or within an organization.

While pursuing change, the process of conflict, or stages of grief, are frequently experienced. Often this is voiced through anger or resistance. As the process continues, however, an opportunity for resolve and growth occurs. The resolution brings forth a better understanding of the organization and the opportunities it can give to both its individual members and society.

Oregon Division members will experience this process as they discuss bylaws changes and resolutions at division convention. Some will also experience resistance to change as they read the AAUW Convention agenda for the Houston convention in June. In the end, the decisions made will make history, just as the decisions made before them, and it is the history of AAUW that will ultimately be the decining factor, as it is not individual choice and experience, but rather the combined experiences of all the members that will influence decision, progress and the future.

Keynote Speaker: Margaret Hallock

"Pay Equity: It's Time," will be the convention keynote address given by Margaret Hallock. Dr. Hallock is currently the Economist and Director of Research for the Oregon Public Employees Union, Oregon's largest union of public employees. She holds a Ph.D. in Economics, was formerly Senior Economist in the Oregon Executive Department, and has been an Assistant Professor of Economics at the University of Oregon, specializing in Labor Economics and Women and the Economy.

Dr. Hallock will address the issues of pay equity, explode some of the myths accompanying it, giving an up-to-the-minute report on developments in the state system and what can be done to support state initiatives. She comes well equipped to address these issues as she chaired the Oregon State Task Force on Compensation and Classification equity, and helped draft Comparable Worth Legislation for the 1985 Legislative Session.

Area meetings this year will develop GROUP DYNAMICS, which is one of the four VoLT workshops designed by the Association to provide training to the community. The workshops will be from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The participants in the Group Dynamics workshop will:

- Develop specific skills and information that will enable each person to function effectively as group leaders or as group participants.
- Become familiar with the effects of the various roles that individual members take within a group on the productivity of the group as a whole.
- Understand the stages in a group's development toward cohesion and efficiency.
