JANE ADDAMS September 6, 1860

Jane Addams was an American settlement activist, reformer, social worker, sociologist, public administrator and author. She was a notable figure in the history of social work and women's suffrage in the United States and an advocate for world peace. In 1931, she became the first American woman to be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize, and she is recognized as the founder of the social work profession in the United States. In 1889, with Ellen Gates Starr, Jane Addams founded Hull House in Chicago, "a community of university women whose main purpose was to provide social and educational opportunities for working class people (many of them recent European immigrants) in the surrounding neighborhood."

An ardent suffragist, Addams said that if women were to be responsible for cleaning up their communities and making them better places to live, they needed to be able to VOTE to do so effectively. Addams became a role model for middle-class women who volunteered to uplift their communities. She was a force demonstrating the power that we women have when we work together for the benefit of others.

LOCAL/STATE INTEREST

Campaign finance reform is a topic that needs to be addressed! An opportunity comes soon to Medford on September 4, when Rep. Dan Rayfield from House District 16 (upper NW Corner of Oregon) has the first forum of a statewide tour. Attending will be election policy experts and other campaign finance reform legislative leaders. Forums will feature a history of Oregon finance reform, discussion of the 2019 legislature's accomplishments, and a community discussion about the future of campaign finance reform.

Mark your calendars and plan to attend: Campaign Finance Forum on September 4, 2019, 7-8:30 pm, Medford Public Library (205 S Central Ave.) This will be open to the public, so bring your friends, enemies, and neighbors.

Remember in 2018 the Oregon legislators coming to hear about student success issues? During this past legislative session, that input resulted in more tax dollars being directed to PreK-12 schools. Sharing your concerns with policy makers works!

FEDERAL LEGISLATION

Politics never takes a vacation (even if politicians do). During the summer, we have had the chance to hear from the many Democrats running for President of the United States in the November 2020 election. For some of you, this is Too Much Information! Each of these candidates has one or more issue which is a top priority that he/she is bringing to citizens like you and me. Calling the public's attention to a problem is a major strategy in trying to effect change. Eventually the final nominee will adapt much of this into his or her campaign.

Information shared by the League of Women Voters on continuing support of Equal Rights Amendment in Congress is to remove the timeline for ratification, now proposed in two concurrent joint resolutions. The ERA is close to final ratification.
