

Construction and remodeling on the Holly Theater has been moving along! Recently, workers installed new heating and air conditioning units on the roof. This phase of the Holly rebuild is for the front portion of the building, which includes office areas, a ticket and lobby area, a VIP lounge and another lounge area on the second floor. Jefferson Live!, which runs the Holly and Cascade Theatre in Redding, will move its offices into the Holly by the end of the year. Despite the delays, there's been a lot of behind-the-scenes work, including the discovery of many lighting fixtures that local residents had salvaged when the Holly shut down in the 1980s. In addition, workers have recreated many of the decorative pieces inside the building that were damaged or lost. The 1000 seat theater will feature a wide variety of entertainment in the future!

CLARA BARTON "THE ANGEL OF THE BATTLEFIELD"

December 25, 1821

Clara Barton was born on Christmas Day in 1821 in Oxford, Massachusetts. She became a teacher at only 15, opening a free public school in New Jersey. Later, after relocating to Washington, D.C., she worked in the U.S. Patent Office before becoming an independent nurse during the Civil War, first seeing combat in



Fredericksburg, Virginia, in 1862. She also cared for soldiers wounded at Antietam, earning the nickname "angel of the battlefield" for her work.

While visiting Europe after the war, she worked with the International Red Cross and fostered the establishment of an American branch when she returned home. The American Red Cross was founded in 1881, and Barton served as its first president. She headed the American Red Cross until 1904, remaining active thereafter giving speeches and lectures. Her book *The Story of My Childhood* was published in 1907. Barton died at her home in Glen Echo, Maryland, on April 12, 1912.

PUBLIC POLICY UPDATE

Our U.S. Representative, Greg Walden, has announced that he will not seek reelection next year. This news ensures that an interesting time will precede the 2020 election, as candidates seek his seat.

Oregon Legislators met November 18-20 for updates from state agencies about the status of their work, any bills that may need review, and issues that may be on the docket for 2020 or 2021 sessions. The next short Legislative session begins on February 3, 2020, and runs through March.

SAVE THE DATE! AAUW LOBBY Day will be February 24, 2020 and is being organized by the Ashland AAUW Branch.

ISSUES UPCOMING: AAUW of Oregon is supporting a pending initiative filing for Fair, Equal and Transparent Legislative Redistricting via amendment to the Constitution, which sets up an independent citizen commission to draw the voting maps (currently handled by legislators and politicians for whose benefit the lines are drawn). The commission will consist of 12 Oregonians: (4 Democrats, 4 Republicans, 4 from neither major party), chosen by a panel of 3 administrative law judges, according to specific criteria laid out in the measure. Information will be public and maps must be approved by a majority of the commission (with each partisan pool represented).

WE'RE GROWING! Due to increased population, it is anticipated that Oregon will gain a U.S. Representative after the 2020 Census. Gerrymandering in other states denies voters a chance to have their vote count. The new Fair, Equal and Transparent Legislative Redistricting measure can decrease the onus of gerrymandering in our state. Not having the "fox in charge of the henhouse" will better represent voters.
