From 1992 to his retirement in 2011, Eric taught geology at Southern Oregon University, advancing to Associate Professor and Director of the growing Environmental Studies Program.

Beginning in 2011, Eric became more active in earthquake awareness promotion. Of greatest concern is the expected large magnitude earth from the 600-mile-long Cascadia Subduction Zone, extending from Northern California to southern Canada. Eric has worked with Oregon Office of Emergency

Management and the Department of Geology and Mineral Industries, giving presentations to groups and agencies in SW Oregon.

His specialties are: Engaging the audience in describing natural hazard setting information, with special emphasis on earthquake awareness & preparation.

Here are answers to the questions from Camille Korsmo that are on your Tea Party invitation:

- ~ A "tea cozy" is a padded fabric on the pot which keeps the tea hot much longer.
- ~ "Samovar" means self-broiler. Bottom section is a large water receptacle surrounding a heat source with a spigot on the front. Originally a charcoal fire heated the water; these days it has an electric cord. Tea can be served continuously for many hours by pouring a small amount of tea concentrate into one's cup and adding hot water from the spigot.
- ~ No one can quote a "Shakespearean reference" to tea because there are none. William Shakespeare died in 1616 and tea was not introduced until the 1630's, after his death.

PUBLIC POLICY by Gayle Clason, Public Policy Chair

It's been a long time coming...

Many years ago, I was a member of the AAUW Lobby Corps in Washington D.C. The Equal Rights Amendment to the *Constitution* was a major issue at the time. Over several months, my partner and I visited 30 different Senate offices, informing them about



the importance of this amendment to the Constitution.

After passage by House of Representatives and the Senate, it had to be ratified by three-quarters (38) of the states to become part of the *U.S. Constitution*

On January 15, 2020, it happened!

Virginia became the **38th state** to ratify the *Equal Rights Amend-ment* – crossing the three-fourths threshold of support required from the states.

Oregon had ratified the federal ERA in 1973. In 2018, Oregon's own ERA amendment had passed in a voter referendum.

Now we need Congress to remove the ratification deadline, so the ERA can become a permanent part of the *U.S. Constitution*.



Why Shift My Gift to AAUW's Greatest Needs Fund?

Many members have asked why giving to the AAUW Greatest Needs Fund is so critical. Here are two reasons:

First, many of our other funds and programs, including the Legal Advocacy Fund and Fellowships & Grants, are already fully supported well into the future.

Second, the Greatest Needs Fund allows AAUW to secure national coverage of our work in the *New York Times, Washington Post*, CNN and other major news outlets, and it finances our advocacy work. Without it, we're silenced and cannot respond to critical events in real time, such as the #MeToo crisis or attacks on Title IX. This unrestricted support gives us the most flexibility to tackle the challenges that women face today.

LYDIA MARIA CHILD

February 11, 1802

In the mid-19th century, Lydia Child was an influential American abolitionist, women's rights activist, Native American rights activist, novelist, journalist, and an opponent of American expansionism.

A writer of both fiction and non-fiction, Child did not believe significant progress

for women could be made until after the abolition of slavery. She wrote that white women and slaves were similar in that white men held both groups in subjugation and treated them as property, instead of individual human beings.

Despite all her efforts as an activist, Lydia Child is probably best remembered for writing the lyrics to "Over the River and Through the Woods (to Grandmother's House We Go)."
