



MUSIC TO OUR EARS!

David Gordon, known as the "Northwest Troubadour," will perform via Zoom for our first general membership meeting of the new season. Popular for presenting a 19th century music and history series that combines melodies with stories, poetry, musings & humor, since 2016 David has also given 38 concerts in Jacksonville benefiting the non-profit Historic Jacksonville Inc. For AAUW, David will share a more current repertoire, he has described as "songs with meaning, uplifting stuff about the power of love, justice, compassion and good things like that."



David first performed in public at the age of 13, singing and playing the banjo. Guitar later became his main instrument. Despite what he laughingly calls his "forty-year classical music detour," he's been an active acoustic musician all his life, After conservatory training in Montreal and Chicago, David made his operatic debut with the Lyric Opera of Chicago in 1973. For more than 40 years, he travelled the world as an opera and concert tenor with a repertoire spanning eight centuries of music in eight languages. He has enjoyed a distinguished and innovative international career as an opera and concert singer, voice teacher, seminar presenter, lecturer and author.

I joined AAUW in 2011, just after Joel and I chose the Rogue Valley area for our retirement, and soon after that,

our libraries were facing closure again. Since I was a retired director of a similar 19-library system, I joined the committee to pass a ballot measure to form an independent library district and was elected to its first board of directors. After that, I took time out to hike, travel and fly.

I had gotten the travel and flying bug as the oldest of four military "brats." Born a Hoosier, I moved with my family to Vienna (Austria), North Carolina, Virginia and California. I studied French and was a foreign exchange student in Quebec,



then graduated with my BA from the University of California. Shortly after, I moved to Alaska, where I live for 20 years, where I met and married Joel and where I earned my pilot's license at age 33, then convincing Joel to let me be his airplane partner. He and I traveled to France many times and we also flew to Iceland, Ireland and Tahiti. Little did he know that these experiences would lead to my flying in all-female cross-country Air Race Classics!

I left Alaska to earn my MILS at the University of Michigan and then returned to the University of Alaska for my MPA. I worked in state public administration and libraries in Oregon, Washington, Alaska, Michigan and California to pay for travel and gas. Last summer we were back in Alaska to visit our daughter and three grandkids. A proud recent achievement: I'm so happy to have finally earned my airplane Instrument Rating (the toughest) at the age of 67!



PUBLIC POLICY

One hundred years ago, the *U.S. Constitution* was amended to give women the right to vote. But sadly, then as now, the law didn't apply equally to all. Due to the prevalence of Jim Crow laws, it took another 45 years — and the passage of the *Voting Rights Act* — for Black women to be able to cast their ballots.

Today, women of color are still unfairly disadvantaged at the polls, as certain jurisdictions work to suppress voting under the guise of preventing "voter fraud." In the past ten years alone, 25 states have put in place new voting restrictions that largely affect marginalized communities.

August 13 marked the date to which American Black women have to work into the new year to finally reach equal pay to what males in the same job earned in the previous year. (For white women, the "Equal Pay Day" in 2020 was March 31.)

Black women working full-time were only paid — on average — 62 cents for every dollar earned by white, non-Hispanic men. This means that it takes more than seven additional months to equal their counterpart's pay for the previous year. As the country battles the COVID-19 crisis, this means that Black women have even less economic security to sustain them. They are on the front-lines at work and at home. There should be no debate: Black women (and all women) deserve equal pay!
