President's Message by Carol Koszyk

On August 26th, five of our Medford AAUW Branch members participated in the "Chalk the Vote" activity developed by the Oregon Women's History Consortium and the Oregon Historical Society to highlight the huge struggle that many Americans have had to be able to vote. It was originally planned for us to use chalk to write on city sidewalks the text of the Constitutional Amendments that gave US Citizens the right to vote. When the City of Medford did not want chalk on the sidewalk, we "got creative." (See associated article on page 3.)



Important Reminders — The year 2020 marks:

- The 150th anniversary of the 15th Amendment (removed race, color or prior servitude from denying voting rights)
- The 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment (removed sex from denying voting rights)
- The 56th anniversary of the 24th Amendment (ended the poll tax)
- The 55th anniversary of the Voting Rights Act (prohibited racial • discrimination in voting)
- The 49th anniversary of the 26th Amendment: right to vote cannot be denied on account of age for those 18 or older (This amendment has roots in an Oregon legal case, Oregon v. Mitchell, 1970)

Together, these five legislative remedies extended the right to vote/suffrage/the franchise to vast numbers of citizens who had previously been denied full citizenship. Each of these pieces of legislation righted previous wrongs by adding new voices to the governance of our nation, and moved us closer to the stated equality laid out in our nation's founding documents.


In Our Thoughts

2020: What a year this has been... with Covid-19. local fires and devastation and now the important election coming soon. In midst of it all, there are a few things that might be left to do: If you have changed your name, your political party or if you had to relocate, have you updated your voter registration? Do you know of others who might need to handle this important action? Please pass along information about updating their voter registration in time for your friends and acquaintances to be included in the November 3 election. Changes must be made before Oct 13th!

It is important to have a **mailing address** to receive your ballot! You can check on-line Oregon Registration and follow the directions (easiest). No computer? The public libraries have them for public use. Or you can go to the Jackson County Elections Office, 1101 W Main Street, Suite 201, in Medford. Blank forms are available there on a rack.

The ballots should be sent to your address on or before October 20th.



Follow the **DIRECTIONS** on the ballot, and **SIGN THE ENVELOPE**.

This year with all of the postal delays, it is important to **VOTE EARLY!** MAIL EARLY or deliver your ballot to one of these designated ballot boxes before 8 pm on Election Day: 205 S Central Ave, Medford 1101 W Main St, Medford 116 S 3RD St, Central Point 510 W 1st St, Phoenix **EVERY VOTE**


