At our December 8th General Meeting, Kristen Sullivan, a Board member of Historic Jacksonville, Inc., entertained our 30 attending Branch members with an enjoyable — and enlightening — presentation about the origins of many of the Christmas Holiday traditions we observe today. She pointed out that it was not until the era of Queen Victoria that Christmas became a special observance with elaborate decorations, lavish

meals and gift-giving; and the idea of Santa Claus came along much later, even though the 1823 poem "A Visit from St. Nicholas," attributed to Clement Clark Moore, introduced a "jolly old elf" in a flying sleigh full of toys pulled by reindeer. (We learned that the poem was published anony-



mously, though, leaving its authorship in question for many.) Nevertheless, as Kristen told us, traditions about gift-giving around Christmas (including Christmas stockings and the source, type and placement of gifts) vary widely even today, depending on where you live in the world.

Kristen's presentation was the perfect kick-off for the Holiday Season, and we thank Robin Smith for arranging this special Zoom presentation!

#### COVID-19 is a Nightmare for Working Moms. Policymakers Must React. Excerpt from *Newsweek* October 26,2020

A program manager for a mid -size non-profit, the woman excelled at her work and felt torn about leaving a job she loved, but she quit.

She had two little kids, and her child care costs added up to almost as much as her takehome pay. "The stress of the pandemic was the breaking point...She just needed to sim-

plify her family's life." The challenges families face blending work and home life have been simmering beneath the surface for decades. Now the pandemic is shining a bright spotlight, underscoring the systemic barriers working families face. The net result: economic progress women have made in recent decades is frighteningly at risk.

Think about child care-full time infant care runs from \$5,500 per year in Mississippi to an astonishing \$24,000 in Washington, D.C. When families crunch the numbers, some discover that daycare or babysitters eat up much, if not all, of one person's salary. And often women —who still make on average just 82 cents for every dollar paid to a man — are the ones to call it quits. That may make sense in the short-term, but the long-term consequences are significant. When women leave their jobs, they lose out on annual salary increases, employee benefits, retirement savings and the opportunity to advance in their careers. Re-entering the workforce is difficult…losses are never fully recouped.

We need to double down on our efforts to close the gender pay gap so women aren't automatically the ones to sacrifice jobs.




