AAUW's first meeting of the 2021-2022 year is September 2nd at 7 pm, via Zoom. You'll be welcomed back with a presentation by the new Social Worker at the Jackson County Library System. JCLS recently expanded its services and underscored commitment to inclusivity with the new staff social worker.

Mehmood Madha received his master's degree in social work from the Columbia School of Social Work. His work focuses on how to address systemic inequity through advocacy and policy change.

"Libraries represent one of the last purely democratic institutions that exist anywhere in our nation," said Madha. "They offer a welcoming and safe environment that marginalized populations or those with limited assets can access freely. As Jackson County deals with the results of both a global pandemic and a series of destructive wildfires, our library system is asking, how can we stepup and better serve our community at a time of unprecedented need?"

Guest speaker Edwin Battistella will present Dangerous Crooked Scoundrels: Insulting the President, from Washington to Trump.

Edwin Battistella has taught linguistics and writing at Southern Oregon University in Ashland since 2000. His most recent book is Dangerous Crooked Scoundrels: Insulting the President, from Washington to Trump (Oxford, 2020). In this book, Battistella shows that insulting the president is an American tradition. Covering American history from Washington to Trump, he places insult in the context of the times. Whatever your politics, this presentation will give you a healthy perspective on today's political climate.

Edwin Battistella is the author of six books (including *Sorry About That: the Language of Public Apology*) and his essays have appeared in *Time Magazine, The Daily Beast, The Conversation, AEON, the Huffington Post, Politico, the Chronicle of Higher Education, Academe*, and *the Library Journal*.


AAUW FUNDS
