The "secret sauce" team helps Rogue Retreat participants build skills, gain knowledge, and access services that provide stabilization and access to resources that help build self -sufficiency and healthy interdependence within the communities in which they live.

#### Where AAUW Funds Donations Went in 2020

- \$3.6 million was awarded to more than 200 recipients for the 2020-21 academic year.
- 180,000 women were trained in salary-negotiation skills through our Work Smart and Start Smart programs to date!
- 30,000 people were reached by our free webinars featuring career tips, advice on activism, interviews with leaders.4 research reports or updates were undertaken this year: exploring the plight of Latina essential workers, women in manufacturing, how college debt disproportionately burdens women, and the effect of gender wage gap on women of color!
- 62,000 letters were sent to elected officials urging immediate action on COVID relief, paid leave benefits, voter access and 227 media outlets have featured AAUW's work in 2020, including The New York Times, The Washington Post, Newsweek, U.S. News & World Report, NBC News and more!

According to my records: our Medford branch has contributed \$4,894 as of 12/08/21 for the year 2021.

Being a first generation student and starting college in a pandemic was rough. Not only that, but doing an EMT program in my first year of college made it very challenging for me. With that being said, I am currently majoring in Fire Science. My ultimate goal is to work in a firetruck; after taking my EMT course, I am thinking of being a paramedic as well. I will graduate with my Associates degree in Fire Science in the year 2023. To conclude, what inspires me to succeed is being a first generation student. I want to be the first one in my family to achieve academic success to influence my younger family members, as well as the Latinx community. Thank you for reading a little bit about me! Thank you!



What is MUWCF? Medford University Women Charitable Fund is the full name.
