#### SATURDAY, MARCH 5TH, 10:00 am

Wenonoa Spivak, the Deputy Director of CASA will be our Saturday, March 5th speaker. CASA stands for Court Appointed Special Advocate. Each volunteer is appointed by a judge to advocate for a child's best interest in court. During the presentation, Wenonoa will discuss a brief history of CASA, the nuts and bolts of the CASA volunteer role, how our local program operates, the impact that CASAs make in our community, and how you can get involved.

#### Samantha Metheny - Deputy Fire Marshal

Samantha started her career in fire service in 1993 as a wildland firefighter. She also volunteered for Jackson County Fire District 5 and worked as an EMT for Mercy Flights before being hired in 2001 by the Medford Fire Department (MFD) as a Fire Fighter/EMT. Samantha worked for MFD until 2006 and resigned temporarily after having her first daughter. She and her husband have two children and Samantha was fortunate to stay home to rear them for nearly two years.

She returned to part-time work as the Program Manager for MFD and in 2010 went back to firefighting full time. She is the only woman to have successfully passed probation for Medford Fire not only once but TWICE, the second time at 42 and the mother of two!

In 2012 Samantha was promoted to Deputy Fire Marshal and found her new niche in Fire Service. She is responsible for fire safety inspections, fire investigations, and is the primary public educator for the department.

#### Lan Roberts —

My husband and I moved to Medford, Oregon on June 28, 2015 from San Jose, CA. My husband was working for Cisco in Santa Clara, CA as a Product Manager. I was a Product Manager for The San Jose Mercury News in San Jose, CA.

Both of us are now retired. We moved to Medford to be a little closer to my father-in-law, who used to live in Eugene. Then he moved to Medford. Sadly, to say, we had only one and a half year with him before he passed away.

How did I learn about AAUW? After my father-in-law passed away, I wanted to find an interesting and mindful organization of women in the areas. My husband did some research and found AAUW in Ashland. I became a member of AAUW in 2019.

A summary of my early years: Born in Hanoi, North Vietnam. When I was less than a year old, the historic Geneva meeting between the Ho Chi Minh cabinet and the French leaders ended in France. The civil war between North and South was over. North Vietnam became communist and South Vietnam became The Republic of Vietnam.

My family became refugees from Hanoi to Saigon. The distance was just about 707 miles, but it was a painful move for my family. This journey within the same country, although speaking the same language and only from the North to the South, was a journey of pain and grace for the seniors in my family. Fortunately, I was too young to realize this. I began a new life in the new environment.

I spent most of my childhood with the courage and loving kindness of my two aunts. As a northerner and Catholic, my father thought it would be best for me to be raised by more highly educated women who could teach me to retain my Northern accent and be a faithful Catholic. He separated me from my aunties and placed me in an all-girls' Catholic school in Dalat, Central Vietnam. I was raised and educated by the kind but restrictive young nuns.

I have so many good memories of this school. I grew up with no man-made toys. We girls created our own games. We helped each other with homework and cleaning our own living quarters. We comforted each other when our parents didn't come to the dorm to take us home for the weekend.

My new journey in America: From June 1972, to this moment in time: A gigantic bird, the Pan Am 747, brought me from Tan Son Nhat Airport in Saigon to SeaTac airport in Seattle.

My sponsors: A kind looking older couple greeted me with a big smile on their faces, and a big sign held in front of the man's chest, with my maiden name: Nguyen Thi Bich Lan, written in italics.

My sponsor, whose name was Goldie, used to teach me English by reading Robert Frost poems to me. Later on, she started me reading many the classic books: The Pearl, To Kill a Mocking Bird, Goodbye Mr. Chips, The Onion Field and many other great books.

My first real American lunch was a grilled cheese sandwich and chocolate cookies.

Life was good then. The reality came 6 months after I arrived in Seattle. I started college in the autumn at the University of Washington. Then I became a college dropout due to the loss of Saigon to the communists in 1975.

I went back to college and graduated from San Francisco University with a BS in Finance.

Life unfolded after graduation. I had many jobs; they were all interesting. The most memorable jobs were:

- Working for the State of California.
- While I was working for the State of CA, by fate, I landed a job for a year with Oliver Stone in Santa Monica, San Diego and Thailand.
- San Jose Mercury News as Product Manager and Community Relation Manager. This is where I met my husband, Jeff Roberts. (Jeff and I have been married for 22 years.)
- Diversity consultant for KMA Kochman Marvrelis as a Diversity Trainer for Boeing, NSA and other companies.

Favorite books: Silence, Sapiens, The Politics of Deception, Thomas Merton: The Seven Story Mountain and Robert Frost's poems. I like documentary movies and nature.

Hobbies: Music, classical piano and painting. I like to help people so I volunteered to work with cancer patients at Providence Hospital and Asante Hospital visiting heart patients.

Claudia Grey, our Oregon State AAUW Funds chair, has informed us that the Kenneth McGraw Memorial has been filled. At the present time a stipend from that endowment is going to Katoria Carter. She is at the University of North Florida and in the field of education working on a M.S. with this Career Development Grant. # **AAUW'S ACHIEVEMENTS**FOR THE YEAR 2021\*

- OUTREACH In the second year of the pandemic, AAUW continued to grow its online programs.
- We hosted more than <u>25 webinars</u> for both AAUW members and the <u>Equity Network</u> learning community.
- AAUW's <u>Start Smart</u> and <u>Work Smart</u> salary negotiation trainings continued to be AAUW's most sought-after programs, reaching more than 188,000 participants to date
- We also piloted a new financial literacy program, <u>Money Smart</u>, to provide women at Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), Women's Colleges and Minority Serving Institutions with comprehensive tools and resources for personal money management.
- We continued our work with Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and other minority-serving institutions (MSIs), thanks to a <u>generous</u> grant from The Coca-Cola Foundation. A total of 32 minority-serving colleges, including 21 HBCUs, 10 women's colleges and one MSI, now offer <u>AAUW's Start Smart training</u>, bringing the number of colleges and universities hosting the program to 145.
- We held AAUW's annual <u>National Conference for College Women Student Leaders</u>(NCCWSL) virtually for the first time in May, reaching 900 aspiring leaders from over 300 campuses nationwide.
- AAUW launched <u>STEMEd for Girls</u>, a pilot virtual program reaching 600 teenagers and 315 caregivers, to encourage high school girls to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering and math.

#### ACTION

- AAUW's <u>Two-Minute Activists</u> sent 68,271 letters to elected officials calling for action on AAUW priorities such as paycheck fairness, paid leave, reproductive rights, student loan forgiveness and more. • All five of the top bills passed the House of Representatives in 2021.
- We continued the work of AAUW's <u>Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF)</u>, which provides resources to brave plaintiffs seeking legal redress against pay inequity other forms of sex discrimination. We supported five active cases in 2021 and awarded two new LAF grants to support law-school clinical programs.
- AAUW launched the <u>Equal Pay Every Day roundtable series</u> to spur conversations and solutions around pay equity in the workplace among employees, managers and senior leaders in the New York metropolitan region.

#### **RESEARCH** -

- Systemic Racism and the Pay Gap, a supplement to AAUW's report The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap, outlines how the wage gap is the result of centuries of intentional structural economic inequalities, exploitation, segregation and implicit bias. This history has created systems that funnel women—especially women of color—into lower paying occupations and undervalue the work of women across sectors.
- Factory Flaw: The Attrition and Retention of Women in Manufacturing, made possible through a grant from The Arconic Foundation, explores the dearth of women in well-paying jobs in manufacturing and outlines ways employers and policymakers can recruit, retain and advance women in this field.
- The Power Gap Among Top Earners at America's Elite Universities, a research collaboration between AAUW and the Eos Foundation, examines women's leadership among the country's 130 research universities. It reveals that few women are among the highest paid professionals at each school. A second report, scheduled for 2022, will examine the dearth of women and women of color in academic leadership roles at these institutions.
- <u>Pandemic Inequity: Latinas and the COVID-19 Experience</u>, part of AAUW's Latina Policy Initiative, assesses the economic and health impact of COVID-19 on Latinas, particularly those who are essential workers and in low-wage occupations

## Bills Supported by AAUW of OR in 2022 Legislative Sessions

- HB 4002: Paid Overtime for Farm Workers.
- HB 4092: Broadband governance, availability and equity.
- HB 4013: Department of Education to establish a pilot program in which certain school districts make onetime distributions to families of students to assist with unpaid rent, past-due utilities or move-in expenses.
- HB 4110: Establishes procedures by which certain crime, abuse or sexual assault victims may request and receive copies of law enforcement agency records concerning cases.
- HB 4146: Department of Corrections to designate a corrections gender-responsive coordinator.
- SB 1521: Authorizes district school board to terminate superintendent without cause only if certain conditions are met.
- SB 1522: Expansion of educational opportunities for youth that have been placed in corrections or juvenile detention programs, providing additional resources to Oregon Promise students and authorizing the development of a plan to bring online equipment, connectivity and infrastructure to adults in custody at the Coffee Creek and Snake River Correctional Institutions.
- SB 1556: Department of Human Services to establish certification process for home care and personal service workers.
- SB 1572: Higher education institutions to provide services to survivors of sexual assault regardless of whether they wish to make a formal report, clarifies definition of "consent" and provides for campus-wide surveys about campus sexual assaults

# News from Past Scholarship Recipients



Amanda Denbeck received a Scholarship from us in the 2010's. Many of you may remember Amanda as she was our Musings Newsletter Editor for several years until December of 2019. Amanda also was the Garden Tour Booklet Editor for two of our Garden Tours (2018 & 2019). Last April, 2021, we had invited Amanda to speak at our virtual General Meeting where we highlighted past Scholarship winners. She was not able to present her "story" to us by Zoom, but this is the letter that we received from Amanda in April 2021:

Since graduating college in 2015, I have been up to...well, a lot! I worked for the Oregon Shakespeare Festival as their help desk technician for a total of 2.5 years. I was working for the festival while I was in my last year of college and they were so gracious to work with my school schedule! After working for OSF, I accepted a job at the Ashland Food Co-op as their sole graphic designer. I am currently employed at the Co-op and am going to be celebrating my fifth year work-anniversary! I also was a part of a local roller derby team, Southern Oregon Derby, and served on numerous committees, competed on the travel team, and was the lead graphic designer for the organization. This last year I started the house search (right when things started getting serious with COVID). I found my home here in Medford and will have been here for almost a year (in May)! Currently I am working on improving my house and also focusing on my freelance business.

I feel an abundance of gratitude and thankfulness that organizations such as the AAUW took a chance with me to help fund my education. I would not be in the position I am today without the help and assistance that AAUW provided to me while I was getting my undergrad degree. While I see my peers struggle with the burden of student debt, AAUW and other organizations helped me graduate Southern Oregon University with not only a fantastic education but also graduate debt-free! I cannot express it enough that I am incredibly blessed to have been chosen as a recipient of the AAUW scholarship. I had the privilege as the newsletter editor to see how much work and dedication everyone in the AAUW organization does to make sure that women get the support they need to allow for all their focus on their studies.

I wanted to thank each AAUW member for their participation and dedication to making these scholarships available to women like me. Thank you for taking a chance on me and for future women.



Chelsea Phegley was an RCC Scholarship Recipient for the 2013/2014 year. Chelsea wrote the following letter to us on April 30, 2021 in response that she could not attend our Zoom meeting in May of 2021 to honor previous Scholarship winners:

Hil

I am so sorry this is coming in at the last minute. I hope that choosing to write something is ok. I'm just not sure I could talk about this last year without getting emotional. I was a 2014 RN graduate from RCC. I am still the only person in my family to hold a college degree. I have worked in Intensive Care the majority of the last 6.5 years, here as staff in the Rogue Valley as well as, a traveling nurse in Washington, Alaska, and Eugene, OR. This year has been heartbreaking to say the least, but at no other time have I felt my skill set was more important than it has been this last year. I am truly here by the grace of my community and donors such as AAUW. I held the hands of so many dying this year whose families were unable to be there to help them pass. I was also honored to volunteer at the Expo as an overnight RN when the fires ripped through our community and so many of our most vulnerable neighbors were misplaced and lost so much. My fortunate security allowed me to donate time and money to so many whose need was so great in the last year/years. I am hanging up my travel RN shoes for the summer and working again with Rogue Regional Medical Center. I am incredibly big on social media I was inspired to look back and share my thoughts. I think this sums up the way that I feel as well as I can put succinctly into words.

This year has taught me more lessons in humility than I ever could have imagined. I have been humbled by the strength of those we like to call our weakest. I have been humbled by the weakness of those I considered strong. I have been humbled by the differences I wasn't able to make no matter the trying. I have been humbled by the major difference one decision can make. I have been humbled by my capacity to hate where I thought I only had love. I have been humbled by my capacity to love where hate had been seeded. If I could dedicate this past year to something, I would like to dedicate it to the people who passed without the circle of those they love surrounding them. To the elders, native and otherwise we'll never get back and whose counsel we gravely need right now, to the children who didn't get to say goodbye to their parents, to the parents who didn't get to say goodbye to their children, to all the people that had to settle for a gloved hand to hold and without the option to wipe away the tears, to all the people who suffered silently and behind closed doors at home, at work, and in hospitals. I would like to honor the silent suffering and all the stories that will never be told. I would like to honor you as I'm sure you have stories of your own. I would also like to honor my community. This year has really sent home a lesson I have known but that hit even harder this year. I am nothing without my community. I am surrounded near and far by some of the most genuine, caring, incredible, compassionate, forgiving, loving, tough-as-nails, ethical, incredibly hilarious, intelligent, and supremely generous humans this planet has to offer. These are the heroes in my life. The angels whose wings carry me everywhere I go. We haven't seen the last of our heartaches, but nothing seems insurmountable surrounded by all of you.

Thank you so much, AAUW, from the bottom of my heart. Your work is so important. I certainly know what it's like to wonder how people you've helped are doing now! So I hope this provides a snapshot that lets you know at least some of us are doing really well, and that you can see that your gifts are truly exponential. Happy Spring!!! May you all remain healthy and with full hearts in the seasons ahead.



# Scholarship Committee

#### Hello Friends!

A new year also means it is that time of a year again for the Scholarship Committee to seek volunteers to review applications for our scholarships awarded to students at both Rogue Community College (RCC) and Southern Oregon University (SOU), our local flagship schools offering educational opportunities for members of our community. We have the great privilege of being able to offer funds to make the journey these individuals are starting or continuing just a bit easier than they might experience otherwise.

Our generous volunteers are asked to commit their time to review, both independently and in a group settings, applications expected to be received in late June and early July for RCC and in March for SOU. The pandemic is still challenging in our area and the world does occasionally cause deviation from planned timelines and methodologies but be assured we rise to the occasion. RCC is also implementing a new process and new program this year which will mean if you are a first time volunteer with us, you will be experiencing a new process right alongside all of us! It is my sincere hope that we be challenged and find a meaningful journey ourselves during that process.

Time commitments can vary slightly depending on the number of applications we receive, but in the past it has been a few hours for each person to take time and score the apThere are also group meetings to discuss the scoring process which is expected to increase this year due to RCC's new system. plications based on our guidelines and each individual's judgment. After the scoring, we review and discuss our leading applicants and finally make a decision as a group. This information is passed onto schools where we await confirmation of our selections.

In addition to the applicant selection process, the Scholarship Committee is also involved in any updates we need to make to the criteria for our scholarships and to handle anything else that might arise unexpectedly. Be assured the bulk of your time commitment will be around reviewing the applications themselves which are tied to the timelines mentioned above that each school has tentatively verified with me this year.



The "Lunch Bunch" is a congenial group of ladies who




