





It's been such fun to get together for in-person meetings. In January, April Hamlin from Rogue Community College did a wonderful presentation on Title IX, which is now 50 years old. We have made a lot of progress in those years, but there is much more that needs to be done. As we continue to move forward, more attention is being paid to race and ethnicity, athletes with disabilities, and people who are non-binary, transgender, or gender queer. April is the Dean of Student Success and Title IX Deputy Coordinator for Rogue Community College, and knows her subject. (see page 5).

In February, we were invited out to the Mercy Flights campus, with a great presentation on the history of the organization by its CEO, Sheila Clough. I especially enjoyed learning about their Mobile Integrated Health Care (MIH), which provides patient-centered mobile resources to help people navigate services available to them to help keep them out of the hospital. We toured their facilities, which included a chance to talk to staff members on the flight teams and to peek inside one of their two helicopters and one of their three fixed-wing airplanes. While I hope none of us have to use their services, it is enormously reassuring to know **that they exist.**

You should have received the announcement from State AAUW about the state conference in Ashland April 14-16. The state board is subsidizing part of the cost of registration so it is only \$30. There are lots of opportunities to learn, have fun, and grow, and I hope to see a lot of you there.

Most especially, it would be great if we had a good turnout for lunch on Saturday, when Andrea Reeder will receive the Breaking Barriers Award. This award is given annually to an Oregon woman or organization, who is not in AAUW, but who has exemplified AAUW's mission in a way that has had an impact on our state's women and girls in the areas of equity and/or education. She was nominated by Medford member Sherry Schroeder. It's great to support one of our own.

MARCH 4th GENERAL MEETING

The Klamath Siskiyou Wildlands Center (KS Wild) works across 8 million acres of public land in southwest Oregon and northwest California, advocating for clean water, old-growth forests, and biodiversity.

Our little corner of the world is home to wild rivers teeming with salmon and steelhead, and our ancient forests harbor rare plants and endangered species, such as the Pacific fisher, Northern spotted owl, and Siskiyou Mountain salamander. Other species like the Gray wolf are just now starting to recover to the region. The Klamath Siskiyou is also one of seven areas in North America labeled by the International Union of Concerned Scientists as a global botanical hotspot. We use advocacy, public education, collaboration, and at times litigation, to encourage restoration and conservation of public lands.

Michael Dotson, our featured speaker for our March General Meeting, is the Executive Director at KS Wild and has been working with the organization since 2013. He first served as the organization's development director and transitioned to leadership in September 2019. Michael supports all aspects of KS Wild's administration and conservation programming, including the Roque Riverkeeper program. He works closely with partners & rural communities to defend wild rivers and fish habitat that are threatened by industrial mining and logging proposals. He enjoys exploring the public lands and rivers of the region as a hiker, backpacker, and whitewater rafter, and you might find him in swimming holes every summer in his favorite wild areas, including the Siskiyou, Wild Rogue, and Kalmiopsis Wilderness Areas.

April 6th General Meeting

The **Center for NonProfit Legal Services** was founded by local Bar Association and community leaders in 1972. Currently, it specializes on essential safety net services which includes: Housing/Consumer, Family Law, Income Maintenance (federal and state public benefits) and Individual Rights (Immigration Law and Protective Services for vulnerable and underserved populations).

The Center's focus includes:

- Furthering affordable and fair housing with disaster relief component to avoid homelessness through housing stabilization
- Improve income for disabled and elderly through income maintenance (SSA, Medicaid, Medicare appeals)
- Reinstatement of drivers' licenses and expungement which removes legal barriers to work, housing and benefits
- Domestic relations (child support and insurance)
- Immigration cases for work authorization, and hold monthly citizenship classes.

Low-income Jackson County residents have been able to receive legal assistance from CNPLS for 50 years, specializing in poverty law.

We collaborate with community partners and local municipalities to address homelessness and provide community outreach and legal education on rights and responsibilities. We partner with Association of Oregon Legal Services Programs on statewide Eviction Defense Program and Oregon Home Ownership Legal Program.

We are fortunate to have Debra Lee, Executive Director of the Center, speak to us. Ms. Lee was born in Toisan, China, and immigrated with her family to Providence, Rhode Island, in 1956. She earned a bachelor's degree from University of Rhode Island, and her JD from Antioch School of Law, Washington, D.C.

Before becoming the Executive Director of the Center for NonProfit Legal Services in 1989, Debra practiced as a legal aid attorney in West Tennessee, Central Arkansas and Jackson County. She has contributed innovative ideas to critical poverty issues, supported diversity, and equal access to justice.

Debra is currently involved with Medford Rogue Rotary Club, S O U Board of Trustees, Medford Housing Advisory Commission, Jackson County Continuum of Care Board, Oregon Community Foundation and the American Leadership Forum of Oregon. Her leadership has brought success to the Medford Multicultural Commission (MLK, Multicultural Fair), and Southern Oregon Chinese Cultural Association (Chinese New Year Celebration - Jacksonville, OR).

Debra's awards include the 2019 WVD Pro Bono Award and 2012 Carl H. Brophy Professional Award and contributed to The OSB Elder Law Handbook, Chapter 4, 2017 Revision. Her professional memberships include the Oregon State Bar, Jackson County Bar Association, and WVD Inn of Court.

We were able to tour their immaculate hanger which holds two Beechcraft King Air 99s and a helicopter, as well as several maintenance bays. We also met their on-duty crew of nurses, paramedic, and pilot, who answered questions and allowed us access to the aircraft. It was amazing! It was reassuring to know these highly trained professionals are there to help us.

Mercy Flights also provides ambulance service to the Rogue Valley, with nearly 30 ambulances to serve the area's needs.

Mercy Flights has several programs in the community, including Mobile Integrated Healthcare, focusing on patients that over utilize emergency department facilities.

Thank you to all our AAUW members who attended this wonderful presentation and tour. This coincided with our Mercy Flights group membership renewal/new members for 2023. JANUARY GENERAL MEETING RECAP

Saturday, January 7, 2023, Program "Title IX".

April Hamlin, Dean of Student Success and Title IX Deputy Coordinator for Rogue Community College has provided additional information in response to questions raised at our January 7th General Meeting:



There were several follow-up questions from my Title IX presentation on Saturday. Here are some of the answers:

- 1. What percentage of female-identified students are in the Automotive program at RCC? In 2021-2022, 26% women; 74% men.
- 2. What percentage of male-identified students are in the Nursing program at RCC? In 2021-2022, 82% women; 18% men.
- 3. What are the "rates" of K-12 Sexual Harassment? https://

A survey conducted by the American Association of University Women(AAUW 2002) on 2,064 students in 8th through 11th grade:

83% of girls have been sexually harassed

78% of boys have been sexually harassed

38% of the students were harassed by teachers or school employees

36% of school employees or teachers were harassed by students

42% of school employees or teachers had been harassed by each other



WELCOME, DEB!

<u>Plain scones:</u> (shared by Camille Korsmo at our Feb. General Mtg.)

Toss together in a medium-sized bowl:

18-oz pkg. Jiffy Buttermilk Biscuit Mix

2 or 3 Tbsp. sugar (depending on your sweetness preference)

Add one scant cup whipping cream and mix gently w/ a fork until well blended.

Shape scones in one of three ways:

- · roll or pat out dough to 1/2" thick and cut into circles
- · drop by rounded Tbsp.
- · use a cookie scoop (mine has a diameter of 13/4")

Place scones on a parchment covered baking sheet. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle w/ granulated sugar. Makes 12-14.

Bake 11-14 minutes in an oven preheated to 425° F, until golden brown.

Flavored scones:

Toss together scone mix and sugar, add $\frac{3}{4}$ cup whipping cream and mix gently w/ a fork until nearly blended. Then stir in one of the following:

- $\cdot \frac{1}{2}$ cup dried cranberries softened overnight in 1+ Tbsp. orange liqueur and 1 tsp. grated orange rind
- $\cdot\,{}^{1}\!/_{\!2}\,$ cup chopped dried a pricots softened overnight in 1+ Tbsp. a pricot liqueur.
- $\cdot \frac{1}{2}$ cup currants softened overnight in 1+ Tbsp. brandy or a liqueur of your choice. Shape & bake as above.

AAUW Medford and the Breaking Barriers Award - GREAT NEWS!!

I am thrilled to let you know AAUW OREGON State Selection Committee for 2023 has chosen our Branch Nominee as the 2022 AAUW Breaking Barriers Award recipient. Andrea Reeder was chosen from three nominees submitted. The committee's comments were that this selection was extremely difficult as all nominees were involved in great work regarding equity. The other branches submitting nominees were Ashland and Lincoln City.

This award will be presented to Andrea Reeder, Executive Director and VP at ASANTE Foundation, at the annual AAUW Oregon State Conference. It will happen on Saturday, April 15th, during lunch at the Ashland Hills Hotel. (I hope you can attend!)

Never a more deserving person, Andrea was selected from 3 very deserving Nominations submitted statewide, Medford, Ashland, and Lincoln City Branches. This prestigious awardee is not allowed to currently be an AAUW member, but someone doing work that directly aligns well with our AAUW Mission, Vision and Goals.



Andrea planned and led ASANTE FORWARD, a 10-year campaign and surpassed the original goal in 5 yrs. Andrea has single-handedly raised nearly \$35 million to support the health system. As a result, in 2021 the new Heimann Cancer Center opened, a dedicated Cardiac Floor, and a Women's and Children's Health Center will be opened at Rogue Regional Medical Center in 2023. These new facilities serve communities reaching 600,000 total population. Community collaborations include United Way, Compass House, Children's Advocacy Center, and all YMCA's. Under Andrea's direction, this aligns with AAUW and affords women opportunity to Explore issues, Get Empowered, and Take Action through strategic planning.

Having personally worked with Andrea on many occasions, I was honored to submit the written nomination from our branch. Her keys to success include engaging women in the campaign council and recruiting women to her board for equal representation. In addition to her contributions on the Asante executive team, Andrea oversees the entire philanthropic program for the health system, including all capital campaigns and initiative fundraising, Oregon Wine Experience®, and two hospitality houses.

Andrea is part of the leadership team, ABIDE (Asante Belonging, Inclusion, Diversity and Equity) committee. It is a major opportunity for Andrea to ensure equal treatment and advancement for women in an organization through policy and culture change. This certainly aligns with AAUW stated values of Integrity, Inclusion, and Intersectionality.

An old saying goes, "You can't win if you don't play the game". We did "play", and WE WON!

Local Educators Discuss Youth Mental Health

These days far too many young people in Southern Oregon and elsewhere face an array of mental health challenges and can't always get the support they need. But it's important to recognize that everyone can play a role in helping the next generation thrive.

"Youth Mental Health and Suicide Prevention" is the topic a free Big Ideas public program organized by the American Association of University Women/Ashland Branch and Jackson County Library Services. It is scheduled on *Tues., March 7, 4:00-5:30 p.m., in the Medford Library* large meeting room, 205 S. Central Ave.

(NOTE: This Big Ideas event is in Medford as the Ashland Library meeting room undergoes renovation.)

Two professionals from the Ashland School District, Assistant Superintendent Erika Bare and Diane Berry, Counseling and Behavioral Health Teacher on Special Assignment, will address a number of topics. They will share trends in youth mental health challenges both nationally and locally and how many school districts are now integrating mental and social-emotional supports into their school days. Bare and Berry will also discuss a variety of ways families and community members can be more informed and intentional in how they guide and connect with children so they grow to be capable, resilient young people.

Erika Bare has worked in education since 2001. In her current role, she has the privilege of leading Student Services, Special Education, Counseling and Behavioral Health, as well as Elementary Programs. Bare began her education journey as a special educator, and then served as both a high school and an elementary school principal. In each role, she was driven to ensure all students have the supports they need to thrive both emotionally and academically.

Diane Berry is a school social worker and school counselor. She has worked at the elementary, middle and high school levels for 25 years. Currently she works to coordinate and support Ashland School District's K-12 Child Development Specialists, Behavior Health Specialists and School Counselors. Berry is passionate about understanding, appreciating and supporting our children's unique journeys toward healthy, connected and caring young adulthood
