Asante Patient Pavilion Tour. Jan. 6th

A project that took years of studying and planning, the new **Asante Rogue Regional Patient Pavilion** will open its doors to patients and the public in February of 2024. Housing many regional services Asante provides to 600,000 people in nine counties spanning both Southern Oregon and Northern California, the pavilion will be home to new surgical units, critical care beds, and the brand new **Olsrud Family Women's and Children's Hospital**. This is the keystone project of Asante Forward which was introduced in 2018 and the community has donated \$62 million to-date for all capital projects taken on by Asante during that time.

The pavilion itself is 450,000 square feet on each floor. Twenty brand new state-of-the-art operating rooms will be housed on the first floor, serving all complex surgical needs that include cardiac, neurological, robotic and trauma. The next two floors house our critical care units which include Cardiac ICU (intensive care) and Medical ICU. This is a net positive bed increase from our old units of 20 beds. The 5th and 6th floors are the new Olsrud Family Women's and Children's Hospital, which will include the new Family Birthing Unit, new NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care), in-patient Pediatric Unit and Outpatient Pediatric Oncology Unit. All of these services are regional in scope and are the only units of their caliber between Eugene and Redding.

Meet us at 9:45 at Entrance B of the hospital which is right off Barnett Road on the south end of the hospital. If valet parking is up and running over the weekend, Jeff highly recommends using it. Follow the valet signs to the front and Jeff & Barbara will be there to greet and walk back to the entrance to the new pavilion. We will be walking quite a bit so please wear a comfortable pair of shoes. There will be spaces to sit as we move from floor to floor, but we will be on our feet for the most part.

IRV LUBLINER — Survivor's Stories of the Holocaust

Irv Lubliner is a professor emeritus at Southern Oregon University (SOU), where his specialty was mathematics education. During his 40-year career, he taught mathematics at all levels, kindergarten through graduate school, led seminars for teachers in 39 states, and delivered over 350 conference presentations, including several keynote addresses.

With degrees from UC Berkeley and Davis, Irv taught for 30 years in the Bay Area (in Novato, Berkeley, and Oakland) and then moved to the Rogue Valley in 2005. After one year spent coaching math teachers for the Medford School District, he accepted a position at SOU, where his primary role was the preparation of future teachers and the supervision of their student teaching experiences. He retired from SOU in 2014 but continues his work as an educator, teaching math, blues harmonica, and literature courses for the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI), where he also served a three-year term on the Council of Directors.

When Irv's mother, Felicia Bornstein Lubliner, passed away in 1974, he inherited her writings about her experiences in ghettos and concentration camps in Nazi-occupied Poland. Irv shared them in classrooms throughout his teaching career. With encouragement from teachers, students, and parents, he created Felabra Press in 2019 and published his mother's stories as **Only Hope: A Survivor's Stories of the Holocaust**, for which he contributed the foreword and afterword. Since then, he has given presentations focusing on his mother's experiences (and his own, as the child of two survivors of Auschwitz) for schools, libraries, book clubs, civic organizations, and over 75 different OLLI campuses throughout the country.

In a handwritten essay composed shortly before she died, **Felicia Bornstein Lubliner** wrote: "Follow me if you will into Auschwitz and spend a day there, and meet some of the people in the nameless mass of bodies. Try, if you will, to feel, even for a moment, that you could have been one of them, that in fact you were one of them." Irv invites you to travel back in time, to follow his mother into the death camps, and to learn about the Holocaust through her writings.

Irv is scheduled to make presentations at Medford Library, Sat., Jan. 20th, 1:00 pm, and Ashland Library, Sat., Jan. 27th, 1:00 pm.

Inspiring Words from **Elaina Foley** (written in Spring 2023)

I am forwarding an article from Elaina Foley, someone near and dear to our membership. This is an update from a young woman that knew what she wanted, grabbed opportunities by the horns, and is making the world a better place. We are currently trying to assist her with graduate work funding ideas.

"I'm just writing to give you an update, now that I've graduated! (4 year full ride scholarship to Harvard)

After graduating with distinction in both of my majors, I've now accepted an Alexander von Humboldt fellowship to spend 12 months at Berlin's natural history museum, in their Humanities of Nature department. I'll be pursuing an original research project entitled "Contemporary US and German Dialogues on Natural History Institutions." This project will result in a published overview of museum approaches to present-day ethical issues around preservation/maintenance, as articulated by community members, scientists, and scholars. With this work, I intend to facilitate more affective approaches to museum-based science.

Right now, my biggest hurdle is because I have applied for an extension to the von Humboldt fellowship to return to the US for 6 months of 2024, unfunded. This extension will provide time for me to research how American natural history institutions are articulating and navigating histories of scientific violence in their contemporary programming. In order to cover my cost of living during these 6 months, I am looking for full or partial funding from institutions in the Northeast US to conduct this research. Being based in the Northeast would allow me to work with the Peabody, American Museum of Natural History, and Harvard's natural history museum. It is my hope to facilitate connections not just between myself and museum actors, but between leading US and German natural history institutions. Any advice you have on who might be willing to sponsor this kind of work would be so appreciated!

While locating that additional funding is occupying most of my time, I'm also trying to relax a bit as I'm living in Brooklyn for a few weeks before I head to DC to participate in Dumbarton Oaks' Plant Humanities program. It's an incredible opportunity to be able to work with the Dumbarton Oaks' garden and museum, as well as to learn from their researchers. I'll be there for July, and leaving for Germany in August!"
