# MEETING RECAP February 3rd GENERAL MEETING Guest Speaker IRV LUBLINER — Survivor 's Stories of the Holocaust

Barbara Laskin introduced Irv Lubliner, an SOU professor emeritus and retired math educamath teacher. Irv presented his mother's experiences in ghettos and concentration camps during the Holocaust. Irv inherited his mother's writings when she died in 1974. He later published her



writings in, *Only Hope: A Survivor's. Stories of the Holocaust* after writing the foreword and afterword.

Irv's mother Felicia grew up in central Poland. Irv spoke of what Jews had to endure including the "punishment of many for the deeds of one," one reason Jews did not fight back. His mother was sent to Auschwitz when she was 16-17 years old. Auschwitz is one of the best known concentration camps as 85% of those sent there were exterminated. Others were sent for forced labor or sent to await transport elsewhere. His mother was liberated in 1945. She lost her grandparents, parents, and 8 siblings. Irv's father also was in a concentration camp. His mother and father met and married in a refugee camp. In 1946 they immigrated to Oakland, CA where Felicia's aunt lived. His mother tried to blend in as an American. Irv regrets not talking with his mother about the Holocaust when she was alive. Irv found his mother's writings and audio recordings of her voice after she died. Irv played one of his mother's audio recordings from a presentation she made at San Francisco State University. Copies of Only *Hope* were made available for purchase at the meeting. also available on Amazon including an audiobook that includes his mother's voice.

Q and A period ensued. Presentation ended with quotes from Felicia as a Holocaust survivor that show her belief in the human spirit as unconquerable: "Are you going to go through your life without learning anything? Or build a life that you think might be of some credit to you? Some credit to those that were not here to watch it?"

#### In Remembrance

**Virginia McGraw,** longtime AAUW member and devoted advocate for education died peacefully on December 30, 2023, in Portland, Oregon. She was born on June 19, 1930 in Alhambra, CA to Herbert and Josephine Shelley.

Always a scholar, Virginia graduated with honors from Diablo High School and headed off to the University of California. While at Berkeley she met and married the love of her life, Kenneth McGraw. With a shared love of educational and travel, they moved their growing family to Europe in 1957 where they spent the next fourteen years living in five different countries while working in American military schools. In 1971 the family moved to Medford, and Virginia embraced life in the Rogue Valley. She taught for many years in the Central Point School District. Upon retirement she turned to travel and, exploring the world with the Friendship Force, volunteering at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, hosting musicians performing for the Britt Music Festival, and supporting the American Association of University Women. Fifty years after she arrived in the Valley she moved north to Portland to be near family.

At Virginia's request there will be no memorial service, however, she would encourage you to raise a glass of good Oregon Pinot Noir for a toast.

## AAUW Scholarship opportunity for JACKSON COUNTY student leaders!

Who reside in JackCo & attend college in Oregon (callout for RCC!)

As Lisa wrote in her *President's Message*, our Branch voted in February to fund one NCCWSL scholarship (National Conference for College Women Student Leaders) for a college student residing in Jackson County. The conference will be held at the University of Maryland, College Park, May 30 through June 1, 2024. We are participating in the new AAUW-OR centralized process.

Registration is still open; the **deadline to apply for an Oregon scholarship is March 20**<sup>th</sup>, which includes transportation, lodging & most meals. **To Apply**, click here:

NCCWSL-OR. Anyone may apply at the national AAUW level through April 14 for reduced cost, or May 15 full cost (https://www.aauw.org/resources/events/nccwsl/).

**THE GOOD NEWS:** As of February 18th, Oregon has **11 applicants** through our central application process: 2 OSU students, 1 SOU, and 8 from UO.

**THE CHALLENGE:** To deploy our scholarships designated to particular institutions, we need one or more applicants from Willamette U or Chemeketa CC; from Pacific U or Portland CC, and from **Rogue CC**. Please encourage any potential student leader who you know and is at least 18 years old.

#### AAUW Funds Report (submitted by Mary W. Gillespie)

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The Medford Branch contributed \$6,278 to National for the calendar year 2023. This includes the \$3,024 from the Camelot fundraiser, and for the individual donations, as well. Thank you to all who supported this endeavor.

In 2024, we have contributed \$2,445 which includes donations
 in memory of Virginia McGraw, a longtime member who died in
 December.

■ The details for the Camelot 2024 fundraiser have been clarified.
■ It will cost \$2,325 to buy out the house of 155 tickets. We
■ agreed to sponsor the comedy, Scapino, on September 18,
■ 2024. The tickets will be \$35 each.

#### GENERAL MEETING RECAP

#### Asante Patient Pavilion Tour. Jan. 6th

Our AAUW group had enough people that we were divided into two groups for our tours of the new Asante Pavilion. I was with Jeff Cool, who is director of development. These notes are rather random—they're what stuck with me after the tour.

Asante is locally owned and governed, with three hospitals covering nine counties and 600,000 people. It is a level 2 trauma center (Providence is lower, at level 3).

When the decision was made to build this pavilion, they thought they would need to raise \$50 million and that it would take ten years. They have raised \$62M in six years. This has provided for some extras: in the original planning, there were going to be four isolation rooms. Now, all the rooms can be made into isolation rooms for airborne pathogens. They're also able to have "patient of size" rooms, with equipment to help move people up to 1000 lbs. be lifted. Normal equipment is rated for people up to 500 lbs.

They now have 20 operating room suites, up from 15, although they don't yet have the staff to use all of them. They also have "shell space" where they will be able to build out easily as necessary.

There are two nursing schools in the valley, and Asante sends staff members as adjunct faculty.

They built a hybrid room, which is part catheter lab and part operating room. While in the room, they can contact the makers of stents to guide the surgeon if necessary.

They're adding a second unit for robotic surgery since the one they currently have is the busiest robot on the west coast.

The labor and delivery floor has its own ER, and each labor and delivery room has a laboring tub. One of the suites for Caesarean sections is two rooms, with a resuscitation suite within it, so that a newborn would not need to be rushed away and mother and baby can be close.

The NICU (neo-natal intensive care unit) is set up so that a mother can recover with her baby; and there are rooms to accommodate mothers who birth twins or triplets. Asante is the first hospital in Oregon, and possibly on the West Coast, to offer this.

There are two pediatric oncologists on staff, the only ones between Eugene and Sacramento. There is also a child life specialist available to work with children and lessen their trauma.

Each of the six floors has a different theme in its artwork, making each of the floors distinct.




#### May 5th General Meeting
