Rick Bailey, SOU President, Guest Speaker



Richard Bailey, Jr. and his wife Diana joined the Southern Oregon University family in January 2022, after 5 1/2 years as the president of Northern New Mexico College and a 24-year career in the United States Air Force. Dr. Bailey received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Engi-

neering Sciences from the United States Air Force Academy, a Master's Degree in International Affairs from Washington University in St. Louis, and a Doctorate in Government from Georgetown University in Washington, D.C.

In his first years at SOU, Dr. Bailey led a collaborative and inclusive campus-wide initiative, SOU Forward, which tackled SOU's \$13 million budget shortfall and planted seeds for a more entrepreneurial approach to achieve a thriving and more resilient fiscal future.

Dr. Bailey's Air Force career included service as an aircraft commander, instructor pilot, and flight examiner. He retired from the Air Force as a full colonel and command pilot. He has served as a military liaison and defense trade analyst at the US State Department and Chief Air Operations Officer at NATO Joint Force Command in the Netherlands. He was an associate professor of strategy and security studies at the School of Advanced Air and Space Studies at Air University, Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama; served as the school's first-ever Dean of Students and President of the Air University Senate. He was awarded the Faculty Excellence Award and received the Muir S. Fairchild Award (for the most outstanding contributor to Air Force Education).

Danielle had our group practice deep belly breathing, then presented other fitness tips that included: the importance of strength training, adequate protein in our diets, good balance, 150 minutes per week exercise, and social connection.

Phantom Tea Party Results!

MUWCF (Medford University Women Charitable Fund) is delighted to report that the 2024 Phantom Tea Party brought in \$11,750 to provide college scholarships for women in southern Oregon. At the April MUWCF meeting we voted to award five scholarships at \$2,700 each with three to Rogue Community College and two to Southern Oregon University. The



Phantom Tea Party also raised \$1,945 for AAUW Funds to support women in graduate studies.

For many years our branch has contributed to ACADEMY, a week-long residential camp, long recognized as an outstanding educational opportunity, held each summer on the SOU campus. Students attending are from the Pacific Northwest who have completed grades 5-8 and have been identified by their teachers and counselors as academically talented and highly motivated. ACADEMY began 43 years ago and we are delighted to sponsor the program this year with a \$950 scholarship. One of our MUWCF Board members had a son attend ACADEMY!

All of this outreach could only be done by the strong support of our branch members who recognize and value the importance of education.

You may be asking: What is OLLI?

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Southern Oregon University (OLLI at SOU) is the Rogue Valley's premier choice for staying intellectually stimulated and socially connected. This 1,700-member organization offers noncredit courses geared to those aged 50+. Classes are held in Ashland, Medford, and offered online.

An annual \$150 membership fee entitles members to enroll in courses from over 100 offerings during three academic terms (September to June). There is no percourse tuition. Course topics include the arts, history, languages and cultures, life planning, literature, movement, nature, personal exploration, recreation, social sciences, and STEM. Learning is a pleasure for members and instructors alike because there are no tests, grades, or academic prerequisites.

Members can establish connections with other curious minds through lively class discussions, social activities, and shared interest and discussion groups, and well as by volunteering on committees or in governance.

Anyone interested in teaching at OLLI is invited to investigate that option. It is not necessary to be an OLLI member to become a volunteer OLLI instructor. A course can be from 2 to 10 sessions from 60 to 120 minutes in length and can start and stop anytime during the term. OLLI also has a course to help one organize their class. The course proposal period for the fall 2024 term runs May 1 - May 31, 2024. Call the OLLI office directly for information about becoming an instructor. Please know that OLLI at SOU membership fees are kept low through member donations and the generosity of the Bernard Osher Foundation.


