MARCH 1ST MEETING

Consortium for Accessibility in the Arts

The Southern Oregon Consortium for Accessibility in the Arts (SOCAA) works with cultural arts organizations, such as theater arts, visual arts, music arts, and literary arts, in Jackson and Josephine counties to enhance accessibility for patrons with disabilities, their family and friends. SOCAA's work includes collaborating with regional arts groups, providing education and training on disability awareness, and developing a pool of service providers (e.g., audio describers, caption operators, ASL interpreters, sighted guides) to support arts organizations. Together, we aim to create a more inclusive and welcoming environment, where everyone, regardless of ability, can enjoy the communal experiences of cultural arts and tourism.

Julie Simon, Ph.D., RID CI & CT (she/her) is an arts administrator, consultant, educator, interpreter, and accessibility activist. After a lengthy career as an ASL/English interpreter in post-secondary and conference settings, she has spent the last 15 years working in performing arts settings, including 10 seasons at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival as Lead Interpreter and as Access Services Coordinator, and 3 years as the Box Office and Accessibility Manager at the Oregon Cabaret Theatre. She is Co-Founder and Board Secretary/Co-Treasurer of the Southern Oregon Consortium for Accessibility in the Arts (SOCAA), and serves on the Program Committee for the Kennedy Center LEAD Conference. As a life-long theatergoer, Julie is working to ensure arts environments are accessible to working professionals and to patrons.

The Housing Authority of Jackson County (HAJC), is a leader in the Southern Oregon Community, providing affordable housing options to Rogue Valley residents. HAJC's mission is to provide, develop, and preserve decent, safe and affordable housing to families

and individuals while promoting efforts toward self-sufficiency. Over the past twenty years, the agency has grown to be the largest developer, owner and operator of multi-family rental housing in Southern Oregon, and today provides housing stability for more than 4,000 Jackson County Households.

Jason Elzy, Executive Director, will present a high level overview of the Housing Authority of Jackson County, the role it serves in the community, and its initiatives underway now and into the future.

GENERAL MEETING RECAPS

JANUARY 4TH GENERAL MEETING Guest speaker **Amber Myre**, CEO, Living Opportunities

Pat Stoddard introduced Amber Myre, CEO of Living Opportunities (LO) at the January 4th meeting. Living Opportunities is a non-profit organization that provides advocacy services to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

LO began in 1974; celebrating its 50th anniversary in 2024. Its 4 focuses are "live, work, create, and learn." LO began with one home supporting 15 individuals. Lithia Place in Medford—a 24-hour residential facility—was added in 2006 and supports 80 people and 40 staff. Another service LO provides is The Studio in Rogue Valley Mall, which offers art, music, and drama classes and other events. LO also provides employment services and assists clients with the employment process


Community business partners support LO's work. Funding includes Medicare/Medicaid, grants, and fundraising events. LO currently supports 180 adults and 200-300 families each year. Amber Myre became CEO of the nonprofit Living Opportunities in 2021. Previously Amber was the Director of Employment Services for Living Opportunities for 5 years. She has been supporting individuals with intellectual developmental disabilities since 1996 as a direct support professional, job coach, manager and family member.



A question-and-answer period followed Amber's presentation.

Guest speaker Kari May






With 25 years of experience working in libraries in Colorado, Utah, and Oregon, Kari May believes that libraries have a vital role to play in a community's vibrancy. JCLS received the Star of Excellence Award from the Medford/Jackson Chamber of Commerce in 2019, and the Ashland Chamber Community Partner of the Year Award in 2024.


Last year: circulated 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ million books, 500,000 digital offerings. 684,000+ individuals physically visited the libraries. 70,000 accessed the libraries for computer usage. The system is now almost back up to pre-pandemic levels.

Library funding is provided primarily (about 95%) from property taxes. Federal funding and library foundation fund-raising are also utilized.



Ms. May stated her intention was to get us to think, "I didn't know the library did that!" The system was started in 1919-1920 and currently has 15 branches. Libraries were closed for 6 months in 2007 due to budgetary limitations and reopened with limited hours until voters approved a Special Library District in 2014. All libraries are now open with expanded hours, though Kari noted that it has been a "rocky road" with the pandemic and local fires.

The mission of the Jackson County Library District is to connect everyone to information, ideas, and each other. A Q&A period followed Kari's informational and interesting presentation.

What's an RMD?

Recently our branch received a generous donation from a friend of a branch member. This gift may have been a donation from a TRUST or in the form of a required minimum distribution (RMD).

For those not familiar with RMD's, when we reach approximately age 73 (depends the year you were born) we must withdraw every year from those retirement savings accounts and the amount is taxed fully under Ordinary Income. However, you can request a distribution for a charity (as **MUWCF**) and that money is not taxable to the charity and you pay no ordinary income tax on the withdrawal from your IRAs or employer-sponsored plans. You do not list it as a deduction on your tax return. The method is the most tax advantaged way to use the money saved over the years.

When the RMD time arrives for you, charitable giving is an excellent way to avoid unnecessary taxes and benefit a worthwhile organization of your choosing.

IN MEMORY

Charlotte Sue Sylvester was born on October 10, 1948, in Lake Charles, Louisiana, and passed on February 4, 2025, in Medford, Oregon. For those of you who knew Charlotte - she was a special soul with a very kind heart and a "can-do" spirit.

Charlotte joined AAUW in July of 1973, and we all honored her in 2023 at our September General Meeting with a 50 year Honorary Member Certificate. Charlotte was an active member for all but the last few years. She served as Interest Groups VP for 2 years; Membership VP for



3 years; the Chair for various groups - Needlecraft (3 years), Gourmet Cooking Skills, Tennis Chair, The Great Outdoors, Dealing With Stress, and the Christmas Lunch Meeting. In 1981-1982, Charlotte was given the Named Gift Honoree Award. Her longer AAUW commitments included being in charge of Meeting Set-up for 10 years, organizing ticket sales for various fund raisers; and being a part of the core group who made the Garden Tour hugely successful. Charlotte's longest contribution to our Medford Branch was being our Yearbook and Directory Chair for 30 years. Wow! One could always count on Charlotte!

She also had a full life outside of AAUW. Charlotte was one of 5 children. Her older sister and brother have passed, but she is survived by her twin brother, Charles Sylvester of Baton Rouge, LA, and their youngest brother, Marcus Sylvester of Atlanta, GA. Since Charlotte's Mother was one of 7 children, Charlotte and her siblings grew up with LOTS of cousins, aunts and uncles.

In 1969, Charlotte earned her BA and Teaching Credential from McNeese State University in Lake Charles, Louisiana. She had met Ed at the Methodist Church in Lake Charles and they married in July of 1970. Ed was serving our nation in the Navy at the time, and their first move as a Navy couple was to Key West, Florida. It was a short stint as they moved back to Lake Charles in July, 1971. After Ed's tour of duty was completed - they moved to Medford in the winter of 1972 where Ed started his career in Forestry at the Bureau of Land Management and they reared their two sons, Edward and Steve. In Medford, Charlotte was a teacher for "home bound" students (they were not able to attend regular school due to illness, discipline issues or pregnancy). She also became very involved in the United Methodist Church, lending her hands to countless projects. She was a CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate) volunteer, and served on their Board of Directors. Her hobbies were yard work, flowers and sewing. The latter was especially appreciated by family, friends, friends of friends and actually the entire community; because Charlotte would sew the softest baby blankets for anyone who asked her. If she and Ed were out having a meal in a restaurant, and the waitress was pregnant - Charlotte would make a blanket for her baby-to-be, too!

Charlotte is survived by her husband of 54 years; her brothers as mentioned above; son, Edward and his wife Beth; son, Steve and his wife, Anna and their 2 daughters.

A memorial service in her honor will be planned at a later date.

Charlotte will be greatly missed by all.

Projects pop-up throughout the year that we need help with from **people at home**. Examples of these projects include assembling kits, folding maps, or cutting materials. We provide all the materials for these projects.

When one of these projects pops up we will email you with the project details and deadline. You will let us know if you'd like to complete that project. There is no requirement to accept projects. Once you accept a project we do require that you complete it within the provided time frame.

Volunteering in the Children's Museum of Southern Oregon There are several different volunteer positions available in the museum.

- •Museum Floor Pop-Up Programmer* Interact with guests and present interactive items like animal furs, musical instruments or building blocks.
- •Museum Floor Program Instructor* Present a program on a regular schedule. We can provide the program or we can work with you to develop one that is all your own. This could be dance, science, imagination, storytelling the sky's the limit
- •Museum Program Assistant* Aid the Program Instructor with various aspects of the program including set-up, delivery and clean-up. Must be available at the times of the programs.
- Museum Detail Cleaner Get into all the nooks and crannies of exhibits to assure that they are clean and sanitized.
- •Museum and Preschool Grounds Care Pull weeds, pick up sticks, trim plants. This position is partly seasonal check with the volunteer coordinator on current needs.

*Museum Program Positions require a commitment of at least 1 hour per week. There is a required training session before volunteering in the museum. This training session takes about 1 hour (some may be able to be completed from home).

Musicians Needed for Program "Sound Painting"

During "Sound Painting", kids explore the interface of visual and audio art in this program - as music plays, kids paint what they hear. Guest musicians are needed to expand kids' exposure to different instruments and styles.

Thursday, Friday, Saturday or Sunday - Arrive by 2:45; start playing at 3 and play for 30 to 45 minutes.





Get ready to advance legislation that makes a difference! This spring the AAUW Oregon 2025 Lobby Days event will be held over the week of **March 17-21** with in-person and virtual meetings over Zoom. We encourage all AAUW of Oregon members to participate in this opportunity for advocacy that is essential to achieve our legislative priorities!

Starting in January, the Public Policy Legislative Reporter Committee began evaluating new bills introduced in the state legislature which are aligned with the following:

- The two specific areas, **Education** and **Healthcare**, recently chosen by AAUW of Oregon members,
- The AAUW Public Policy Priorities, as seen at the bottom of this letter, and
- We will also be following the progress of HB 3187 Anti-Age Discrimination Bill on which we collected petitions earlier in favor of the bill.

Training materials on the selected bills will be posted on the state website and a **mandatory** training meeting will be held on March 13th at 7 pm.
