President's Message

Greetings, all!

Spring has sprung, the grass has riz—and I know where the flowers is. It's so much fun seeing all the bulb flowers come up!

I'm looking forward to our "Spring Buffet" on May 4, and hope to see you there. Kathy Swarts and her committee always do a lovely job! We will be installing our new officers, **Deb Radcliffe** and me as co-presidents for a one year term, and **Marilyn Stein** as Finance VP and **Sandi Cameron** as Program VP, which are both two-year terms. (more info on page 2)



As President, I receive AAUW's annual report. (If anyone wants to see it, let me know. I'm happy to share.) Some of the things that I found interesting are that AAUW is the oldest non-institutional major funder of graduate women's education, providing \$146 million to over 14,000 women in 152 countries since 1888. It's diverse (75% has gone to women of color), global (international fellows come from 43 countries), and local. 45% of the awards support individuals and projects focused on STEM. It's a good reminder that the work we do is important.

AAUW has offered NCCWSL (The National Conference of College Women Student Leaders) for 39 years. Nearly 500 women from more than 125 institutions came together in 2024, engaging in a variety of sessions focusing on leadership development, professional growth, activism, and discussions on pressing women's issues. The attendees had a chance to network with peers and mentors, and to hear from renowned speakers. Half of the students received an AAUW National Scholarship or direct support from branches across the country (including Medford, which gave one scholarship). In 2025, it moved to NASPA, an organization for student affairs administrators in higher education, although AAUW will still be there and will continue to support students (see page 8 for more info.)

We have earned a 4 Star Charity Navigator Rating and a Platinum Transparency Seal from Candid in 2024, recognizing AAUW's commitment to transparency and impact.

AAUW is working to raise awareness of the ERA (Equal Rights Amendment) and have it recognized as the 28th Amendment, believing that it has met all the constitutional requirements for ratification.

Claudia Gray, who is the AAUW of Oregon Funds Chair, also sent out information. Of AAUW's 33,000 members, only 17% donate to AAUW. In Oregon, 31% of our members donate and 93% donate to the Greatest Needs Fund. Mary Wright Gillespie has more information about donations and two new funds on page 4. She also reminded us that our dues are now 100% tax deductible.

Katie DuPraw is willing to take on the role of Public Policy Chair. Thank you, Katie! I'm looking forward to being more informed about what we might be able to do to affect public policy, both here in Oregon, and nationally.

Toni Wallick has been working with the homeless since 2016 mostly at the Housing Authority of Jackson County. She has also worked at Head Start, Family Nurturing Center and RV Council of Governments with the elderly. She has been a board member since the beginning 4 years ago.

The program started as a way to put some of the 1.5 million empty bedrooms in Oregon to use and help with loneliness. It has evolved now into being more women centered since 70% of our participants are women. We have home providers in most Oregon counties and want to work with organizations to spread the word that we are a viable alternative to preventing access. In addition, we are working to stabilize access to affordable housing.

MARCH 1ST MEETING, Rogue Community Credit Union

Southern Oregon Consortium for Accessibility in the Arts (SOCAA) was founded in 2024. SOCAA works with cultural arts organizations, such as theater arts, visual arts, music arts, and literary arts, in Jackson and Josephine counties to enhance accessibility for patrons with disabilities, their family and

friends. SOCAA's work includes collaborating with regional arts groups, providing education and training on disability awareness, and developing a pool of service providers to support arts organizations.

SOCCA's website, www.socaa.net, has a calendar of all their activities. How to help: donate, volunteer, provide housing or transportation for out-of-town providers, or space for workshops or meetings.



APRIL 3RD MEETING, Sun Oaks Club House

Jason Elzy, Executive Director of the Housing Authority of Jackson County (HAJC), presented a high level overview of the Housing Authority of Jackson County, the role it serves in the community, and its initiatives underway now and into the future.

The HAJC is a leader in the Southern Oregon Community, providing affordable housing options to Rogue Valley residents. HAJC's mission is to provide, develop, and preserve decent, safe and affordable housing to families and individuals while promoting efforts toward self-sufficiency.

Over the past twenty years, the agency has grown to be the largest developer, owner and operator of multi-family rental housing in Southern Oregon, and today provides housing stability for more than 4,000 Jackson County Households.

MUWCF REPORT

(Medford University Women Charitable Fund)

2025 Phantom Tea Party / Scholarships!

The MUWCF Board is delighted to report that the 2025 Phantom Tea Party brought in \$14,765 to provide scholarships for women in southern Oregon. In addition, AAUW members donated \$1,800 to AAUW Funds to support women throughout the United States in their graduate studies.

From the donations and MUWCF funds, we voted to award four \$2,700 scholarships to Rogue Community College, three \$2,700 scholarships to Southern Oregon University, and one \$960 scholarship to ACADEMY.

ACADEMY, a week-long camp for academically talented students completing grades 5-8, will be scheduled in June on the SOU campus. This will be the 44^{rh} year that ACADEMY has provided this residential camp to students in the Pacific Northwest. Two of the MUWCF Board members shared how their children had benefitted from this camp. The \$960 tuition includes housing and meals with outstanding programs and activities.

This outreach could only be done by the strong support of our branch members. THANK YOU!

AAUW Funds

The branch's contributions to National for this year, 2025, are to date, \$2150. Our total giving for last year, 2024, was \$6,298.50. Last year over 6 million dollars funded 277 Fellows. At the present time the Greatest Needs Fund currently covers communications, public policy, program development, and operating costs. Many of the Funds that we specially supported have reached their goals. In light of that we have two new funds to support. They are: #4513 Defend Higher Education and #4337 Public Policy. When you contribute to AAUW Funds you can designate a specific fund. And I checked with Claudia Gray, our State Funds chair, and now our total dues amount is deductible on our taxes.

DOLLY PARTON IMAGINATION LIBRARY LUNCHEON

We were so pleased to have a full AAUW members table at this celebratory luncheon on March 4th, at the Rogue Valley Country Club, represented by 2 of our branches. Thank you



to Ellen, Peg, Lisa, Mary G., Marlene, Karen Spence (AAUW Ashland), Betty and Monica (see photo) for supporting this important program!

Why, you might ask? The Dolly Parton Imagination Library embodies our mission of education and equal opportunities by becoming ready for that first day of kindergarten and being successful in school. Monica Weyhe hosted the table as this was not officially sponsored by AAUW or our branch; sponsors were United Rotary Clubs of Southern Oregon and Jackson County Library Foundation (JCLF), with Phil Meyers, CEO of Southern Oregon PBS as MC and one of our former presenters. Kari May, library system director, introduced this program to us as our February presenter.

This luncheon was the celebration of the 2nd year of the Dolly Parton Imagination Library (DPIL) in Jackson County, and it is growing quickly. Dolly Parton launched this program in 1995 to benefit the children of her home county in East Tennessee to ensure that every child would have books, regardless of their family's income.

DPIL is a book gifting program that mails free books to children every month from birth to age five in participating communities, now including Jackson County, and including 2 million children nationwide and in other countries, e.g. Canada, the UK and Australia. Each participating child receives a book every month by mail, addressed specifically to them. Much brain development occurs in early childhood, and studies have found that if we can support development during these years, it is a predictor of success in school which creates the potential for significant benefits for our children and our community.

Rotary and JCLF and its libraries, as Local affiliates or sponsors, are responsible for enrolling children in their geographical area and securing funds to cover the wholesale costs of these quality books and mailing, about \$5 per child per month. You can help make an impact by donating financially or volunteering your time, like your AAUW sisters did.

Meri Aaron Walker is a fire-forged artist, writer, and lifelong communication researcher whose work spans five decades of reporting, visual storytelling, digital imaging, teaching, coaching, and organizational development. She's been the grateful recipient of well over 100 grants and professional awards and her artwork has been included in museums and public and private collections across North America and Europe. A lifelong writer, photographer and printmaker, Meri lost her home and studio in Talent to the 2020 Almeda wildfire. Recovering from the trauma, she recently decided to teach other senior adults her method for making and publishing short, personal narratives as multimedia EBooks.

Her current passion is focused on supporting elders' creation of modern, soulful EBooks that can preserve and pass on their lived wisdom while also sparking intergenerational conversation that strengthens connections between friends and family in a world drowning in noise.

These days, Meri lives and works in Phoenix where she's continuing to make her own mobile digital art, write, teach and publish her own multimedia EBooks. She finds great joy stoking the fires of other elders' storytelling using their own photographs and a few well-chosen words.

NCCWSL UPDATE by Monica Weyhe

As you've recently read, the NCCWSL (The National Conference of College Women Student Leaders) leadership training program has been transferred from National AAUW to NASPA, an organization of Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education. AAUW Medford funded one student last year, but the new short timeframe did not work to be able to do so this year through either our branch or MUWCF. However, the good news is that AAUW Oregon included funding for scholarships to send 3 students to this training in Washington, DC, from May 28-30; Salem is funding 2, Hillsboro/Forest Grove will award 1 to a Pacific U student and Gresham will send 2 from Mt. Hood CC, making it 8 attendees from Oregon.

Past recipients have been extremely appreciative of this leadership training and what it means for their future success, with all of them intending to share the strategies learned with others too. Monica is on the state NCCWSL committee and helped select and now pay for the students' costs for travel and training. One of the state recipients is a senior at SOU majoring in healthcare administration and nursing, so she is from our AAUW South District. Medford Branch and MUWCF will explore possible funding from us next year.

Oregon News

There have been many questions about how we can engage in events protesting decisions and actions taken on a national governmental level while retaining a non-partisan stance. (Thanks to Diana Ricks for sharing the following information.) Here is an article written and shared with AAUW of Indiana members:

"AAUW is non-partisan, but we are **not** non-political. We stand for equity for women and girls which includes education and economic security for women. We know that some of our branches and individual members plan to participate in one of the many Saturday's Hands Off! National Day of Action gatherings alongside our friends in LWV and other groups. We want to send this note of encouragement but also remind you that if you are going as an AAUW member or branch to keep signs (comments to the press, etc.) AAUW priorities related. As a non-partisan organization, any sign/communication indicating AAUW must not have comments pro or con about a politician or political party, but must deal with issues only. Use our Public Policy Priorities for messaging, conveying what our organization supports. For example, instead of messaging "AAUW says Deport Musk", you might say "AAUW Supports Public Education". Of course, many of us may be going as individuals, not as representatives of AAUW and can say or demonstrate however we choose! **Thank you** for your advocacy and membership in AAUW!"


